SE Centre Events and Competitions

The SE Centre has run the events listed in the April Newsletter, all COVID compliant and well supported as reported elsewhere in this newsletter. Sadly, the lifting of the final restrictions has been delayed from June 21st until July 19th, so until then, the maximum group size of 30 outdoors or no more than 6 people or 2 households indoors remains.

MG Covid 19 compliant activities so far have been organised regionally and largely coordinated via the local meetings, Natters and Wanderers Groups, do keep in contact with your local coordinator.

In Kent, the activities have been principally organised by the Natters in Canterbury, East Kent Wanderers, North Downs and Trotiscliffe.

For Surrey and Sussex, in addition to the Natters, the Drive-it-Day run to the coast, Spring Run to Leonardslee and MG display at Brooklands all take place as mentioned previously.

Competition and Event Update Planning is underway for a SE event in August, probably similar to the Spring Run with a short driving run and an interesting venue. This will be followed by the Autumn Gathering at Lullingstone Castle on $19^{\rm th}$ September.

As mentioned in the last Newsletter, the SE Centre is keen to start some competitive events in participation with other motoring clubs in the SE. The type of events was summarised in the January Newsletter and are all none car damaging including planning for an Autumn Trial to be initiated shortly. Other options include grass autotests (some classed as taster events). Please contact me, John Morgan, Competition Secretary, if you would like more information or to confirm an interest to take part/have a go.

The SE Centre is also partaking in an MGCC main club working party to review requirements for club events to be fully Motorsport UK compliant and ensure that the correct guidance is available on the Club website. It should be remembered that events run under the Motorsport UK permits/certificate of exemption are fully insured by Motorsport UK. This requires events to be planned in accordance with the Motorsport UK 'Blue Book' that summarises the rules and obtaining permits/certificate of exemption ensure compliance with the Road Traffic Act/Motor Vehicles (Competition and Rallies) regulations. Any other events such as Natter activities or Social Runs rely on the MGCC club insurance and still have to comply with statutory regulations (only exempt if 12 cars or less)

We are encouraging members to use the online facilities of the club. It is the place where you will find all the latest information about the South East Centre and all the events that are being planned, plus reviews and pictures of those that have taken place. You'll also find archive copies of this newsletter to look back on. It is gratifying that an increasing number of members are finding the site with nearly 1600 views in May and what is looking like a similar number in June – if you are not sure where it is then the url is www.mgccse.co.uk. The most popular pages that people visit other than the home page are the events list and the natters list, so it is clear people are trying to find out what is going on in the South East Centre.

Interestingly a large proportion of people finding the website are directed by our Facebook pages and it is there that you will find the bang up to date stuff! There are two pages – one is public facing and gives details of events and reviews, you can make comments but it is only the Centre that can post initially on it. The second runs off the back of that and is a member only chat group – on there you can post items yourself, ask questions, show us your car, post event pictures – anything goes, within MG reason of course! To join that you need to answer a couple of questions about your membership including your membership number.



You will find this newsletter has arrived a little differently too as we have moved over to Mailchimp to send it out to you. We hope that this will provide better management of our email lists, you'll find an unsubscribe button on the bottom if you don't want to hear from us anymore, naturally we hope you don't use that one but we do realise that members sell their MGs and move on sometimes.

Web & Social Media You will have found this by clicking a link in the initial email - this stops any issues with the size of the email clogging up your system or causing it to be undelivered and prevents potential layout issues too. The big advantage is that the actual sending of the email is controlled and will no longer risk our personal email boxes being blacklisted! We are only recording your name and email address in Mailchimp, which is a secure system, and your details won't be passed to any other organisation. 
We are pleased to inform members of several SE Committee changes.

Drive it Day

Fairmile "Brooklands Two" Car Display 12th June - Jon Glover

Following our successful little gathering for our Natter faithful and friends – about 20 fine vehicles – in October last year, Ian Ailes and I decided that a return visit, might be in order as we might get up to 25 if the weather is kind. June 12th was the date allotted to us by our Brookland's mate, the ever accommodating Steve Castle.



In 'normal' times that would have been, a 'Double Twelve' day celebrating the former 24 hour race which in 1930 became a 2 day event comprising two 12 hour contests following vociferous protests by local residents who objected to losing a nights sleep. How appropriate that in 1931 the race was won by MGs on handicap, beating among others the mighty Bentleys. The start of a golden era for MG, their racing prowess boosting sales of the tiny Midget.

Somehow by a process of internet osmosis, our planned little Natter outing became a major event, almost compensating for the loss of The Museums 'MG Era' event for the second year running! As well as opening up to all SEC Members, we became a conduit for 2 Anniversary celebrations, both delayed by a year .

We were joined by our friends in The MGCC Vintage Register, celebrating their 60th and cars from the F Register, marking 25 years since the blockbuster launch of the MGF at The Geneva Motor Show. To add spice to the mix, my London friends in The Waterloo Classics Group, ventured from The Metropolis in an eclectic mix of cars including several MG's a 1959 Corvette, a Jaguar XK 120 and a Ronart Racer.

So, in all over 100 cars for the public to enjoy, stationary in our parked groups, or on the move in demonstration laps round the finishing straight. The Museum also contributed its own MG's, their black and red Midget and the late Colin Reynold's Cream Cracker restoration .

Our Fairmile Natter / SEC group numbers easily exceeded the current Covid protocols put in place by the Museum, meaning that cars displayed on the banking and towards The Members Bridge had to be split into 2 groups – Pre and Post 1980.

In the Pre display special mention goes to John Langford's 1964 Magnette. The original lady owner left this car to a 12 year old Nephew, who seems to have shown little interest in the bequest as the car languished, slowly rotting in storage for decades until finally purchased for £750. The car is now an absolutely delightful a credit to John after a full painstaking restoration.

Mark Hanson, who always turns up in interesting MGs from his collection, arrived with his Works MGA which, on a standard engine, competed successfully in the 1956 Alpine Rally and was the first Works car raced by the incomparable Pat Moss – well incomparable to everyone but her recently departed brother!





The Post display reflected the growing appreciation for the last of the British MG Rovers . These are classics NOW, with a great following among the appreciative. Among the F's, I picked out David Koskela's TF 160 Spectra- one of 25 painted in this strangely Chameleon like paint colour - in one light mauve, in the next blue and so on. Among the Z's, I particularly liked David Price's 180 Monogram – one of only 26 built.

Fairmile Brooklands Two Car Display Then a bracing walk down the Finishing Straight slope to the Paddock fence and the earliest MGs displayed by The Vintage Register. The incredibly fresh state of all the early models displayed drew admiring crowds throughout the day. Worthy of particular mention – Patrick Gardener's 1928 18/80 , with its cute Dicky or 'Mother in Law's perch ' and the menacing Tigress of Anthony Littlejohn. Many admirers, new to the first MG's, commented on the size of these 3 and 4 seat open saloons. Giants compared to the little Midgets alongside.

Other than we were blessed with a blisteringly hot day, which reminded me of sharing an ice cream at a previous 'Double Twelve ' on a similarly blazing day, with legendary MG Racer, Barry 'Sideways' Sidery-Smith, the weekend before he died. Ian and I agree that we have never received so many messages of appreciation – thank YOU for turning out in such great numbers. Special thanks to John Davies for bringing Sail flags and the Covid marshal vest to be worn by yours truly – does it have to be pink?

As one wag pointed out at 4 pm when my sun block had worn off –

Musings from Canterbury - John Clark

The Canterbury MG Owners Workshop natter "kicks off the new season"!!.....

The second major stage of the Government's exit roadmap happened with the 17th May being the date when we could meet outside in number and a limited amount inside.

Cheap as Chips MG!

Cheap as Chips MG! - John Bennett

When I were a lad, in my 20's anyway, I remember buying a roadworthy TC for £170 at a time when my annual salary was £2,100, some 8% of my income. (I later went upmarket with a £240 TD!) The charm of the MG marque at the time was the amount of affordable fun the cars gave to the youth of the country. The prices charged for these same cars today clearly puts them beyond the reach of all but we old timers whose children have left home (mostly) and whose mortgages have been paid off. What a tragedy!

But hold on a minute. My TC was almost 20 years old when I owned it and its 20 year-old MG equivalents today are the F/TF range whose prices start as low as £500, so much, much, less than 8% of a typical young person's salary, assuming they are in work at all. Admittedly, £500 won't buy you as much reliability as my £170 TC gave me all those years ago so a more realistic comparison might be the £2,000 I paid for a decent TF a few years ago, or 8% of a £25,000 salary. It gave very few mechanical problems although I did have to have replacement front wings fitted before selling at a modest loss.



I have just been rash enough to buy my 26^{th} MG, a 20 year-old 108,000 mile ZR 160 Steptronic for £750, sight unseen. Stupid or what! Part of the logic for this was to see if cheap, reliable, fun, MG motoring could still be had in 2021. I half expected it to have head gasket problems, though not immediately, so its first trip had to be to Steve Lucas in Pluckley to have that problem dealt with together, I hoped, with a fix to allow the passenger front window to go up and down on command. £270 later found me driving home with a multi-layer head gasket fitted plus a new window motor, water pump and timing belt. What more could possibly go wrong!

The answer soon turned out to be the alternator whose output must have been just enough to run the engine with no extras but, in heavy rain, I had unsuspectedly been running with all the auxiliaries ON. Inevitably, halfway home, the wipers began to slow down and although I then switched everything OFF, I soon lost the speedo closely followed by the engine! Thanks to our noble Chairman, Chris, who soon arrived with his jumper cables, I managed to nurse the car home. So, the balance sheet has now had another £65 added for a Chinese made alternator, complete with 3-year guarantee, plus £170 for a thorough service at my local Go-To mechanic, Dean.

Does that mean I now have a decently reliable and presentable car? Not quite. I still need to sort out the seriously worn driver's seat plus the paint on all the wheel arches has begun to bubble. I plan to deal with those issues on a DIY basis for a budgeted £100. This will bring my total outlay to about £1200 considering servicing as an inevitable maintenance overhead, even though, come to think about it, I needed no help to keep the old TC on the road.

So, do I regret my purchase? Absolutely not! The car is great fun to drive with that typical MG combination of eager surefooted responsiveness and it looks the part too. Putting it to rights on a budget is an interesting challenge too that still has some way to run.

So, it seems as though fun MG motoring need not be beyond the means of young people today, just as was the case 50 years ago!

On Tuesday the 1st September 1964 a young teenager named John Hill left Torquay and collected from Salisbury an MG NB 4 seater registration BDD 356 for the grand sum of £50 pounds. Having seen the car shortly before at the garage John was well pleased to collect it on that day and still has the diary entry celebrating the fact. A student at the time and somewhat impoverished the N type gave him 18 months of pleasure before selling it for a nice profit in 1966 for the grand sum of £75 pounds.

John has been an active member of the MG Car club for many years and actively campaigned with his wife Jenny an MGB in regularity trials over many years. Previously John tried to track down the car with the help of a friendly Policeman when it was traced in the late 60's to an address in London W9 but not licensed.

Fifty four years later John spotted the car in Safety Fast after a photo was published of the car performing wedding duties for my youngest daughter in 2018. Over the years since restoring the car in the mid 80's it has travelled extensively and performed wedding duties for both our Daughter's and family friends including a wedding in France.

Unbeknown to myself for 15 years since acquiring the car it was actively campaigned in pre-war trials by its original 1936 owner Henry Irving Wilkes from Cheltenham who was one of a small group of triple award winners in 1937 and mentioned in Wheelspin the definitive C.A.N May book on trials (I had the book for years and never made the connection) The car finished up in the USA near Seattle for many years before importing it in its original sad state as a restoration project. I was the first to restore it from the ground up but it retains many of its original features and was useful transport for our young family .

So, on a pre-covid summers day in 2019 John and his wife came over to be reunited with the car and drive it for the first time in 54 years. It bought back many happy memories to be reunited once again with something you last saw as a teenager!



Beware of your Insurance Policy Small Print - John Morgan

I recently renewed my classic car insurance. For many years I have been insured with Peter Best Insurance mainly because they were underwritten by an insurer who did not specify undue security requirements when leaving the car parked.

Members Corner The issue arose when my previous insurer required the roof to be raised, windows closed and doors locked whenever the car was parked even if out on a Club run or at a rally. It only applied to cars with door locks such as MGBs and Midgets. Peter Best originally confirmed that it was acceptable to leave cars open as long as personal possessions, etc. were not left exposed.

So, upon renewal this year, the renewal documents confirmed under "Reasonable Care, 'protect any INSURED VEHICLE from loss or damage" as well as an intrusive garaging requirement. This is very much open to interpretation and I sought clarification. The response was:

Beware of your Insurance Policy Small Print!

The garaging endorsement on the policy will only cover the vehicles if they are kept locked within a locked garage (as stated) between the hours of 23.00 and 06.00. If you were to leave the garage or the vehicles unlocked and a theft occurred, you would not be insured. The garaging endorsement only applies when the vehicle is kept at the risk address (your home).

You would also need to take reasonable steps to secure the vehicles at all other times. For example, if you are away from home at a venue and the vehicle is to be left unattended, then the hood needs to be raised, windows raised and where available doors locked. Keys removed from ignition and personal possessions removed from show. Hiscox have confirmed that whilst sitting on your driveway at home during the day, if you were to leave the car unattended for a short period, i.e. to get a cup of tea etc., then it would not be necessary to raise hood/windows etc., however, please still remove keys from ignition and lock vehicles (where possible), again do not leave items on show. If the vehicle was to be left on driveway for any longer period, then the hood/windows would need to be raised as well.

This is totally unacceptable as it would result in constant raising/lowering of the hoods on any sort of Club event or activity or serious issues if working on the car in the garage meaning it couldn't be locked.

At about this time, the MGCC changed its preferred insurer to Cherished Vehicle and bizarrely they only required windows to be raised and doors locked (again only where car have fitted door locks) but the hood did not have to be raised and alternatively, the tonneau counted as a hood.

My insurance is now with Cherished who were also more competitive on price. The moral of the story is CHECK YOUR INSURANCE each time you renew. If the small print is not adhered to and the car stolen, there are a lot of CCTV cameras around that can prove how the car was parked.
