We celebrate 100 years of MG this year. The actual date of creation is often disputed so the MG Car Club has decided to celebrate across two years beginning in May this year and ending in May 2024. MG itself has always been a bit vague on the actual start date as you can see in the separate article in this newsletter. However, it is around the right time so let's celebrate!
There are some large MG100 events this year starting with a big bash at Gaydon to launch it all on May 27th and following it up with the combined MG & 100 th birthday at Silverstone on June 10 th /11 th . There are other more regional events around the UK and one for the post-Abingdon cars also planned this year. In the South East we'll be holding our own MG100 celebration on July 16 th at the Bluebell Railway Horsted Keynes station
and will be finishing with a huge MG100 South East event at Brooklands Museum on 18^{th} / 19^{th} May 2024 – so pop both of those in your diaries. The Brooklands event is the only one scheduled for 2024 at the moment and will bring to an end our Centenary year.
As this is the first newsletter of the New Year, I would like to remember 2022 and in particular thank some of our leaders who have now moved on. Firstly, Su Joel who led the Surrey Wanderers group stepped down last year and we are delighted that Philip Bayne- Powell has stepped up to the plate as their new leader. Then Richard Clark, who admirably led the Ashdown Adventurers for many years, moved out of the area and that group is now on hold, although a small group do meet for lunch still. Finally, the sad news that Dennis Webb, who led the South Downs Natter, passed away in the summer and that group, too, is on hold until a new leader can be found. Our condolences go to Dennis's family. A big thank you to all of them from the Centre for all the voluntary work they have put in over the years for the MG Car Club. We would also like to thank all the current natter/wanderer leaders for their work in promoting the club and organising meets/runs etc near you. If you haven't been to a local group yet then do look them up on our website and make 2023 the year to join in.
I also want to thank the committee who work tirelessly to bring you events and help the Natter and Wanderers groups plus all the volunteers who help out with marshalling and, of course, our natter and wanderer leaders themselves. You'll see some new sail flags this year at main events and new table flags at group meetings that have already been sent out. We've also purchased a new Coleman shelter which will actually fit in the back of an MG, which had its first test outing at Belmont House and worked very well. This is much easier and lighter to transport and you will see this out and about in the future rather than the old and heavy pop-up gazebos. We also have our new online shop, managed by Alex Lemon with Ace Embroidery Ltd and I hope that you took advantage of that to buy some gifts for Christmas? If not, then the New Year is also a good time for a new MG Car Club South East wardrobe so we can see you resplendent in the new gear later this year! The cost of living and energy prices are making it hard for all of us and the club has introduced a new Direct Debit scheme to help you remain a member at a reasonable monthly cost – a £10 initial payment and then 10 monthly payments of £5. That's about the price of a pint of beer per month so do let any potential new members know that it doesn't have to be expensive to join the MG Car Club – and don't forget it's all run by the members for the members!

The MG Affinity scheme gives large discounts off new MGs and a new club MG Advantage scheme is coming soon where local traders offer discounts on parts and services. Just two of the benefits of membership alongside all the activities you experience in the South East of course!


Committee Notes

	The SE Centre 2023 Calendar is near finalisation and should be available early in the New Year, printed copy in the March or April Safety Fast and also on the SE Centre website.				
Committee Notes	Although many of the MGCC events are classified as non-competitive such as the Road Runs (or Motorsport UK Title of Touring Assemblies), they still need to comply with Motorsport UK's Rules, because the MGCC is an affiliated club and Motorsport UK provides significant event insurance. This is where my role as Competition Secretary ensures that events are correctly planned.				
Competition anf Events	Looking ahead to 2023, the SE Centre is still keen to promote 'grass root' competitive events that members can enter with standard MG road cars with little risk of damage if driven with care. This ideology has always been part of the MGCC heritage with the club participating in trials and racing almost from when the club started in 1930, before the Second World War and largely responsible for the amazing growth of the club. Young drivers were eager to buy their MG M types, J2s, etc. and compete in the events of the day. Some of these events are fascinating to read about as modern day events do not come close to the stamina required in the 30s with the relatively poor roads of the day.				
	In the main our competitive event participation will be in conjunction with other clubs in the SE, but new for 2023 will be an MGCC SE Centre organised Autosolo. Looking ahead to 2023 we have planned primary participation in:				
	 The usual Valentine Treasure Hunt on 19th February, being organised by Epsom MGOC, who have an extended an invitation to up to 10 SE Centre members' cars. The SE Centre is planning an Autosolo at Filching Manor in East Sussex on Saturday April 15th using their Go Kart track. This is an ideal event for the novice, as the routes are all indicated by cones and direction arrows, with no reversing or route memorising required.

- An Autotest Taster day event on Saturday May 7th in Kent, again at the invite of MMKMC. The taster day is intended to give members a chance to have a go or practice their autotesting skills and it will be on grass and therefore, non-damaging. Later in the year there are several clubs who run grass autotest events for which we can request invitations.
- Currently two events are listed for **Car Trials**, **2**nd **April and 1**st **October**, organised by MMKMC. Early in the New Year I will be liaising with our members who have expressed an interest and confirm either one or both of the events. For more information on Trials refer to the reports on recent events in the newsletters or on the website.



- Our **Spring and Autumn Naviscats** are planned for **26th March** and **1st October**. An excellent step up from Treasure Hunts, testing skills in map plotting, navigation and strategy planning. The SE Centre events for 2023 will be classified as Taster events meaning that non-members can take part.
- Autumn Leaves Road Run and Scavenger, West Sussex, 15th October.

In addition to the above events that have been outlined, as the SE Centre is a member of the Association of South Eastern Motor Clubs (ASEMC), our members are automatically invited to enter numerous competitive events organised by motor clubs from all over the SE region. This includes clubs such as Sevenoaks Motor Club, Bognor Regis Motor Club, Farnborough and District Motor Club, etc., all of whom organise a programme of competitive events throughout the year, including a series of grass Autotests, Autosolos, Trials and some MGCC members have in the past regularly entered events such as Autosolos.

Finally, the 2023 SE Centre Calendar will includes dates for planned MGCC Race Meetings at Brands Hatch and the dates of MGs on Track events being organised in our region. 

Sunday 2nd October 2022 had a tricky weather forecast that did little to prevent a pleasing variety of MGs and other marques from attending an event which took place in very welcome sunshine! Once again, the Inter-Register Club and the Ashford Motor Club joined us for this event.

The contestants met at The Black Horse PH in Stansted, just North of Wrotham in Kent from 10.0am for a bacon roll breakfast. Map references were handed out at 11.0am and our hosts kindly allowed us to make good use of their dining tables to plot our routes before we set off.





The area chosen for the event was navigationally challenging. On paper, the map references appeared confusing because both the "eastings" and the "northings" were very similar numbers. The local topography of narrow country lanes, steep hills and an area littered with unsigned cross-roads demanded a keen sense of direction and good driving skills for success.

None of the contestant lived locally and the furthest travelled car was a beautiful white 1935 Austin 12/6 Newbury open tourer from Walton-on-the-Naze! The age of the contestants also broke some records: The oldest Driver was 81, the youngest 19, the oldest Navigator was a very young 85 and the youngest was only 10!!





No two Naviscat questions are ever the same – the easy 1-point drive-by questions included finding a happy seat and a cat crossing and the more difficult 2 and 3-point questions meant searching for an angel and a crashed Hurricane etc.!

I have pleasure in telling you that every competitor was back at The Black Horse for their pre-ordered Sunday Dinner by 2.30pm. Once answer sheets were collected, photographic evidence of the correct answers was displayed for everyone to examine. Answer sheets were marked immediately and the results together with prizes were handed out before everyone said their farewells and left for home.



This year we held this event in October, in the hope of encouraging more entries, as it had been held in December in previous years. Fortunately, the weather was kind to us and 12 entrants met at the Camelia Botnar Garden Centre which is off the A272 between Cowfold and Buck Barn.

The route had been designed by Stewart Penfound and provided an excellent and interesting drive through the West Sussex countryside and a number of villages where the entrants stopped to find answers to the various questions. After coffee and the opportunity to take on board sustenance entrants left the garden centre turning right and heading South toward Partridge Green. Here participants stopped to seek out answers to several questions before returning to their cars.

The route then took everyone along the High Street and to the junction with the B2135 where we turned left driving South towards Steyning. The village nestles at the bottom of the South Downs and was the next stop for participants to answer more questions. After leaving the village the route continued South crossing the South Downs on the `Bostal Road, before joining the A27 at Sompting.

Looking South from the Bostal Road there are some spectacular views out to sea and the Rampion Wind Farm which is 8 miles off the coast and the answer to one of the questions!

On arrival at the A27 the route turned East and after a short distance Shoreham Airport appeared on our right a signal that it was time to turn left and head North parallel to the river Arun. The route took us past Lancing College a landmark on the South Downs and after a couple of miles we entered the villages of Bramber and Upper Beeding the penultimate stopping point for participants to seek out the answers to several questions.

Talk by CPC Batteries

Fairmile Natter Update Steve Thompson of CPC Batteries based in Tolworth Surrey gave a talk to the Fairmile Natter on 10th November. Car batteries are only part of their business as they supply the lighthouse batteries for Trinity House and they can supply car batteries for vehicles from the 1920's! Steve brought a selection of modern and old style batteries along to show us and explained the pros and cons of fitting modern batteries against replicas which use more modern internals in old cases. They tend to cost double and are 65Ah against 95Ah. If your battery is under the back seat, do you need a replica. If it's under the bonnet and you show your car then OK.

Steve also explained the advantages of and how to fit twin 12v in place of 6v for longer life and better starting. 12v are now available in 6v sizes. He also explained why you should replace them in pairs to avoid 'shunting' which is why they tend to fail. A good piece of advice is to drive at least 10 miles when you go out to fully recharge the battery and don't use conditioners all year round as they can over do the charging. Batteries like to be used. A total of 16 members attended and were surprised how much they did not know or had forgotten. Several were sent back in time to school days physics which haven't changed but are used in different ways these days.





<u>Tune Up Day</u>

What a fantastic morning we had and the weather was just perfect, dry, sunny and mild. The Fairmile organised a Tune-up morning hosted by Gordon and Mary Stanley deep in Pirbright Forest. There was lots of space to tinker with MGs and make some noise! Ten members attended and five cars went under the 'spanner', a TC, two TFs, a BGT and a C.

Following happy birthday to Eric Worpe with cakes, we had a safety briefing with more cakes and coffee. Members then paired up and got stuck in to see how well set up their engines were. Professional quality tools were on hand to check dwell, timing, balance and mixture. All the carbs were well balanced, and jets centred but some were running rich and some jets were unevenly set – easily checked with a vernier. Float chambers also needed some attention. Setting the timing and checking the airflow on the TFs presented a challenge for our experts on hand but success prevailed.



After more cakes and doughnuts, the cars began to sound sweeter and gradually got put back together for a lunchtime departure and happy run home. This was the first time we had tried such an event and we plan to do it again in the spring, concentrating on just one or two aspects of maintenance. Future topics include tracking and tappets.

Anniversary Cars - Tim Morris

The actual start date of MG is a matter for debate. Why the confusion? Well, it is all down to Cecil Kimber who can be rightly considered as the father of MG. He came to work for William Morris in 1921 as the Morris Garage business was booming alongside the separate Morris Motors manufacturing company producing Morris Oxfords. Kimber was duly appointed as sales manager for Morris Garages and so came within the Morris firmament. A twist of fate occurred in 1922 when the general manager Edward Armstead suddenly resigned and a few weeks later committed suicide. Kimber was promoted into his position and immediately seized the opportunity to begin designing his own body work to fit on Morris Oxford chassis. By 1923 Cecil, with his wife Rene, were working hard designing car bodies and Rene would often model with them when the car was produced in Morris Garages adverts. These rebodied Morris Oxfords sold well and Kimber was encouraged to make more of these Morris Garages conversions.



The iconic "Old Number One" was begun in 1924 at the same time as the first advertisements marked as MG appeared and was not actually the first MG! It was based on a modified Morris Cowley chassis which held a special overhead valve Hotchkiss engine and built specifically to compete. It was finished on March 27th 1925 with a two seat body built by Carbodies of Coventry. It was the first "MG" designed and built using Morris components and not simply a conversion of an existing model. A four-seat tourer version was also built which featured in Autocar in May that year. The first car to be advertised as an M.G. was a Chummy bodied Morris which appeared in the first edition of "The Morris Owner" in March 1924. There is a reference to M.G. Sports cars being built in a Morris Garages pamphlet from 1928 that states M.G. Sports car were first introduced in 1923. The MG octagon logo also first appeared in advertisements in 1924 and was registered as a trademark that year.

So, we have three years – 1923 when Kimber first began designs and rebodied Morris cars and there is that early pamphlet reference; 1924 when M.G. Supersports models began to sell well and when the first original model began to be built from scratch or even 1925 when it was actually finished. But perhaps we are all too early as officially the MG Car Company did not come in to being as a separate entity from Morris Garages until March 1928, in which case we need to wait another five years! The confusion is understandable as MG was undergoing considerable evolution over these three years. Now we come to some more confusion – the first MG marketed as an anniversary model didn't arrive until 1975 – the MGB GT Jubilee.



MGBGT Jubilee

It was only made as a GT as part of a marketing ploy as the GT had recently failed US Emissions tests, hence the decision to try and boost sales with a 50th anniversary model in 1975. This was the beginning of the limited or special edition MG models and it took a long time to arrive. All the Jubilees featured British Racing Green paintwork with a distinctive gold side stripe and all the available optional extras including headrests, tinted glass and heated rear screen. Special anniversary badging appeared on the front wings and the MG badges were gold too. The Wheels were from the V8, which was suffering reduced sales due to high petrol prices at the time, but sprayed gold and black. There were 751 made and there were two "one-offs" - a Midget in the same colours and a V8 roadster, in the slightly different shade of Brooklands Green, which was offered as a raffle prize in the US. One further version of the GT was made with a V8 engine, which it probably should have had in the first place, for the British School of Motoring. All were of the new "rubber bumper" type designed as a fix to get around US Import rules. Although there was a Limited Edition run at the end of the MGB timeline the specials/limiteds would not re-appear in earnest until the MGF.

MGF 75th Anniversary

The MGF was a marketing department dream with lots of limited and special editions designed to boost sales. Most of these were in fact just different trim levels but, never to let a marketing opportunity go by, they resurrected the MG anniversary with the 75th Anniversary MGF. The car was launched in March 1999 and so took us back a year from the Jubilee B to 1924 being the "birth" of MG. All future anniversary models would stick to 1924 as the base year. They came in two colours, mulberry red and solid black, with grenadine red leather interior and contrasting hoods (black on red, red on black – although you could specify the other way round!) with a silver option available overseas. Chrome pack and 16" multispoke alloys in both engine types. A small 75th anniversary badge appeared on both front wings and a numbered badge on the T bar. UK numbers restricted to 500 and 2000 worldwide.

Anniversary Cars MGTF 80th Anniversary – image above

Never ones to rest on their laurels there were ten different MGF/TF editions between the 75th and 80th LEs! Launched in January 2004 the 80th LE is a good-looking car and often considered one of the best of the Limited/Special editions. It came in three colours – Pearl Black, Starlight Silver and Goodwood Green. The silver and black cars had a red hood, ash grey interior and grenadine Alcantara/ back leather seats with bright finish accessories. The Green one was more of a traditional "country" style with a tan hood and interior with black Alcantara/ tan leather seats plus wood effect inserts on the console, doors and gear knob. All variants had 1924 MG 2004 embroidered on the seat backs and chrome fitting on the boot lid. They were available in all engine variants. Limited to 500 in the UK and 1600 sold worldwide. It is an 80th LE that has the distinction of being the most expensive MGF/TF having been sold in 2004 for £275,000 – it was at a special charity auction run by fashion designer Jeff Banks.






MGTF 85th Anniversary

Conveniently there was an anniversary model produced in each of the three main MGF variants – MGF, MG Rover TF and SAIC TF. The 85th LE was perhaps the ultimate in refinement of the MGF family – a re-engineered working of the standard SAIC 135 TF. The outstanding work by the engineering team was led by Ian Pogson (who spoke to us at our annual lunch in 2022) and completely reworked the suspension system with the addition of Bilstein shocks and Eibach anti roll bars. The car's geometry was checked by hand by members of the engineering team as it rolled down the production line. The "twist of pepper" alloys were provided by Rimstock and the car came in three distinctive colours – Ice White, Enigmatic Silver and Intense Cassis all with a contrasting purple or silver double stripe and special "85" vinyls on the sides. It is the most refined of all the F/TFs and a handsome way to finish the F/TF dynasty (yes, some standard 135s were made afterwards!). Numbers were ridiculously low, for such a fine car, with a run of just fifty (Ian says there were actually 51!) which is a great shame and so much more could have been made of it – particularly if a 160bhp version was made!

MG3/690th Anniversary

SAIC had produced the 85th TF but when the 90th anniversary rolled around in 2014 there was no sports car to make a special edition from so it fell to the humble MG3 and MG6. Only 90 cars were produced and were basically top of the range models with some extra badging on the boot lid, wings and embroidered head rests. A special MG roof decal was included on the MG3STYLE spec car and the black roofed MG6 was the TSE model. The MG3 came in three "trendy" colours – White on the Tiles, Smokey Blue and Silver Fox whilst the 6 came in two colours - Granite Grey and Platinum Silver with black alloys. These cars were shown in June 2014 at Silverstone alongside an all-electric concept called the MG Dynamo – whatever became of that! MG offered an MG3 free to a lucky customer if they sold all 90 models - we don't know if anyone did get that free one or even if they did sell all 90! At the Beijing Auto Show of 2014 MG showed nine anniversary model MGs so it should be emphasised that the ninety 3 and 6s were for the UK - other anniversary models featured worldwide.


