Our two Naviscats and this Autosolo are our events for this year and we will hopefully build on that for 2024 but, it is the usual story, please support these events as we won't be able to continue with them if not enough members join in! Our Competition Secretary, John Morgan, is our lynch pin to national and local motoring organisations and South East Motor Clubs – we are invited to join some of their events as well as them helping with ours for which we are very grateful. The South East Centre has traditionally been very involved in motorsport but this has lapsed over the years so it is great to see us building up a new legacy.

We are, uniquely, holding two awards events this year. This is in order to get us back on a track that was derailed by the pandemic. Committee Notes	The MGCC SE Centre is a member of the Association of South East Motor Clubs (ASEMC). This means that MGCC SE Centre members can enter events organised by other motoring clubs in the south east. The ASEMC is currently updating their website, but very shortly there will be an up to date list of south east sporting events. <u>https://www.asemc.co.uk/</u>		
Competition anf Events	The ASEMC is promoting motorsport in the SE throughout April and elsewhere there is a summary of events, locations and organising clubs including the MGCCs Brands Hatch Race Meeting and the SE Centres Filching Manor AutoSOLO.		
Update	The Filching Manor AutoSOLO is the first competitive event since 2010 and as at the end of March 2023 was attracting renewed interest among MGCC members. The event is being held on 15th April and entries close a couple of days before. More information is available on the SE Centre website and a similar event can be watched on the YouTube SE Centre channel of an event organised by Sevenoaks & District Motor Club at Brands Hatch:

	For those unfamiliar with AutoSOLOs, the video provides a good introduction and the Filching Manor event will be similar to the Brands Hatch Autocross circuit. The AutoSOLO concept is a controlled driving route around a coned course in a forward only direction with the cones indicating route direction. Scoring is based on time taken plus penalties for hitting cones, etc.		
	Other imminent events include:		
	 The Spring Meeting at the delightful Lullingstone Castle and Gardens. The event will include two scenic road runs, Concours and Pride of Ownership. See SE Centre website for more information. An Autotest Taster Day event on Saturday May 7th in Kent, again at the invite of MMKMC. The taster day is intended to give members a chance to have a go or practice their autotesting skills and it will be on grass and, therefore, non-damaging. Later in the year there are several clubs who run grass autotest events, for which we can request invitations. The Spring Naviscats took place on the 26th March and this is followed by the Autumn Naviscat on 1st October. An excellent step up from Treasure Hunts, testing skills in map plotting, navigation and strategy planning. The SE Centre events for 2023 will be classified as Taster events meaning that non-members can take part. These events are becoming an increasing popular alternative to 12 car rallies. 		
	Finally, the 2023 SE Centre Calendar includes dates for planned MGCC Race Meetings at Brands Hatch and the dates of MGs on Track events being organised in our region. Inspired by ex Unniversity Motors (U.M.) employee and regular natter attendee, Ray Mears, ably assisted by his son Neil. Pete Beadle ex U.M. Parts Manager is also a tireless conduit to his old colleagues.

Not only did our audience enjoy hearing about the good old U.M. days , as many were U.M. customers at Epsom, but we also reckon that we provide a good excuse for the U.M . 'boys' to get together, bouncing off their memories and reliving their youth. The resulting energy generated is worth the admission price alone!



We welcomed 2 new U.M. faces this year, Robin Lawton (Sales), now with his own long established Classic Car Business and extraordinarily the one and only JOHN TWIST the University Motors Michigan Founder, You Tube Workshop Video Guru - a man followed by millions of the MG community world-wide

Fairmile Natter Update John entertained us royally with the story of his life, service behind a typewriter in Vietnam, a love affair with an MG TA which sparked a desire to work in England post war. How he was marooned in Belgium until he finally ended up in the U.M. Hanwell workshop, learning his MG Trade before setting up his own, MG 'Shop' as the Americans call a garage. Extraordinary times in London, early 1970's, Spanish girls, one of whom became his first wife and appalling English diners by picking up and devouring hamburgers by hand in the Yankee style!

Now retired, but seemingly busier than ever, John spent a great deal of his short time with us fielding mobile phone calls from all over the States, his disciples worshipping at the feet of their Guru. Whilst forking Fairmile Fish and Chips, his favourite meal, Twist sorted everything from lumpy running to correct gaskets. The Lord only knows at what time in the States some of the callers were still in their garages!





John was preceded by the afore mentioned Neil Mears speaking on and superbly illustrating the life of Northern Irish Pre War U.M. salesman and racing driver Hugh Hamilton.

Whilst not giving one of his terrifying test drives, Hamilton raced MGs at Brooklands and in Ireland, before competing in Grand Prix across Europe, finally being tragically killed on the last lap of the 1934 Swiss Grand Prix whilst driving a Maserati rather than one of his beloved K3 's or Midgets. A heart attack rather than driver error sent him off the track into a tree.

So, sadly his life ended at 29.

Neil included an extraordinarily vivid film of MGs racing at Brooklands during his exposition, filmed from one of the cars proving that even in the '30's the track surface was truly awful!

After a refreshment break we had our ex U.M. panel part of the meet. Anecdote followed anecdote as well as a spirited defense of The Morris Marina – tweaked version.

As lunch beckoned the meeting wrapped up with an audience challenge – name a part that Memory Man Pete Beadle can't give you the number of – prize – a pint!

Nearly won by Ashley Hinton, Pete getting half of an obscure Heater component reference. Ashley got half a pint .



I should also mention a couple of other distinguished audience members .

'C' Register Chair, Colin Howe and wife joined us having journeyed from the Midlands -Colin owns the most eccentric of the famous U.M. 'C' specials and Vic Young, 'C' Register Technical officer who displayed his U.M. 'C' at the entrance to the pub.

The unusually clement February weather also brought out a large number of Members MGs for their first meet of the year an impromptu display which drerw a large crowd.

Lunch, swiftly and efficiently served by our Fairmile team, was a chance to enjoy more Natter between audience and guests before John Twist was whisked away by Pete Beadle to complete a punishing long weekend with a V8 dinner and a visit to The Stoneleigh MG and Triumph Show. Pinner Natter Update

As I noted in the last Newsletter the Pinner Natter is continuing to grow and this is very encouraging for us. Whilst we are gaining members via South East Centre publicity we get a good amount of interest a direct result of publicity left in our very local MG dealer. With the lighter months on the way I anticipate we will get more interest as a result of a very in your face mini POO at the Queen's Head from May until September. The car park is big enough to hold a good number of MGs! The Natter has a very diverse age profile with members from 20 plus and this has to be good news for the future. Our members MGs are diverse and at our events cars have ranged from a J2 and K3 right up to a ZS EV.

During the year the Pinner Natter holds a number of events along with its monthly Natter meeting at the Queen's Head. This is important for our Natter members as with Pinner being on the periphery SE Area events members are generally not willing or unable to attend due to the often considerable distances involved. As already noted mini POO's are held from May to September in the Queen's Head large car park, regular bi monthly Breakfast meetings which are becoming increasingly popular (27 members at the most recent Breakfast on the 5th March) and midweek lunchtime meetings which are preceded by a short drive. At the end of January we always hold our annual Post Christmas Dinner and in January 2023 we had 22 members sitting down together. Due to the proximity of several of Abingdon Works Centre Natters (Chesham in particular whose annual Pride of Ownership in June is a must for Pinner Natter members) and a local MG Owners Club meeting we are fortunate in being able to attend a number of good events locally and in return we get good attendances at our Breakfast meetings and Natters on occasion.

MG4 - UK Car of the Year 2023

The MG4 EV has recently received the prestigious UK Car of the Year award. The awards are voted for by a panel of 27 motoring journalists and the MG4 has been recognised as the Best Family car for the second year running in addition to this year's top award. The MG4 won by a considerable margin against this year's rivals. Unlike 2022, where the top four were electric, its closest rivals were normal ICE cars with the seven-seat Dacia Jogger being runner up and the Toyota GR86 Coupe in third place.

Guy Pigounakis (MG's UK commercial director) received the award and said "The MG4 has proved to be a hit with both existing and new customers since it arrived in September last year and it is also hugely encouraging that so many expert reviewers hold the same opinion as well. We'd like to thank everyone at UK Car of the Year for this award, this is a significant achievement for MG." Picture belowshows the MG4 in action.



The 27-strong UK Car of the Year Awards panel was not short of praise for the MG4.

"The MG4 does everything better than anyone could have imagined for the budget," reasoned Jonny Smith, host of The Late Brake Show.

Meanwhile, Carwow's Paul Barker described the MG4 as: "The car several other manufacturers will wish they had built. Proof that electric cars can be strikingly good looking while also relatively affordable, practical and usable."

"MG has done a great job of bringing EVs to more people, thanks to its pricing," commented Andrew Clews, host of The Motoring Podcast, while judge James Batchelor also picked up on this cost-effective theme: "An MG you can finally recommend on style, quality and valuefor-money."

The MG4 is no stranger to awards with this being the fifteenth it has received since its launch alongside its 5 star Euro NCAP safety rating.

There is no doubt the MG4 is a game-changer, with its relatively low cost, long range and equipment, for both MG and the wider EV world although, surprisingly, it was the MGHS that topped the charts for the first time as the best-selling car in the UK in the early part of this year. Will that change as the year moves on and more MG4s make their way to the

<u>Living with an MGB for 50 years – John Morgan</u>

I could never have imagined when I collected my new MGB Roadster in September 1973 that I would still be regularly using the car some 50 years later. It has been used as the main workhorse for all manner of MGCC meetings ever since from competing in club events to workhouse for carrying the paraphernalia required for running club events.

The car was bought new from Mann Egerton in Wallington, Surrey on 17 September 1973. It cost £1,562.56 including £25 road tax and £139.77 VAT. The Abingdon Build date was between 19 to 26 April 1973 and it was despatched on 6 June 1973. Mann Egerton had struggled to obtain a car for some couple of months so it was unclear where it had been sitting from June through to September.



The car is Teal blue and one of the few now still having the original Ochre trim that was only available for the 1973 model year up to July before reverting to Autumn Leaf. The ochre is a pleasant light colour and surprisingly, probably easier to keep clean than black. It also makes the cockpit light and airy when the roof is up. As delivered, the car was Cadulac rust proofed as a BL option.

The MGB was the third of three I have owned. The initial introduction to MGBs was during a visit as a teenager to a family friend whose son had an MGB and a demonstration run gave the first impression of the car with that lovely distinctive exhaust note that they were known for in the 1960s. The first MGB was in fact my second car (the first was the family 1951 Austin A40 Devon given to me by my father and one I still own and run now) a 1965 MGB roadster in British Racing Green bought in 1968 which turned out to be a restoration project waiting to happen, as the sills had already been bodged. This was replaced in 1970 by a Tartan Red 1969 MGB roadster a mark $1^{1}/_{2}$ as it had the earlier body/trim but later mechanics. In 1973, the MGB V8s were being converted by Ken Costello in Kent before the factory released their MGBGT V8 and following a visit and demonstration I decided that this was the next step for me. Following discussion with Ken, he advised that my MGB was really too old to be converted and it was decided to buy a new car.

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By the time it arrived in the September, the Oil Embargo had struck and at the time, it was considered that it was the end of private motoring. I still have the ration books that were issued. This resulted in the decision to drop the V8 conversion plans.

Following purchase of the new MGB there were a lot of warranty issues including the driver's seat with a small tear, eventually resulting in correspondence being exchanged with the Abingdon factory. Mann Egerton were equally as bad handling warranty items, they managed to break the windscreen replacing the pop rivets holding the hood clips (and then claimed delays in returning the car were due to problems getting parts??) and whilst replacing the damaged seat cover, they placed the seat onto the soft top roof where it promptly fell of damaging the boot lid paintwork. I did come close to changing the car for a 1974 model.

Steering wheel vibrations at 60MPH to 70MPH continued for the initial years of ownership. The Rostyle wheels were changed to Minilites in 1975 to improve wheel specification, but the problem was eventually found to be a combination of poor quality tyre manufacture and issues with wheel balancing machines that were incorrectly calibrated in the 1970s. Not been an issue since.



In the first year, the car covered 15,000 miles being used as the main car until the first company car came along in 1977. It was in 1974 that I became more aware of the clubs such as the MG Car Club and I got involved with their meetings and 'Natters and Noggins'. Whilst returning from a Natter in Surrey in 1976, an errand Mini decided to lose control and remodel the front of the car resulting in the need for extensive repairs. This was entrusted to the MGA racing guru Roy McCarthy and factory repair panels were sourced mainly through University Motors in Epsom. The MG was back in regular use again by the following year.

Other than the front end rebuild in 1976 following the accident, the car remains largely unrestored:

• Other than the repaired front, nearly all the body panels are original including doors rear wings, boot, sills and floor pans with only minor repairs to the rear wing/sill joint, a common water trap in MGBs.

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- The Mechanics are also original, the engine was rebuilt at 95,000miles and continues with the current mileage of 145,000miles, still with the same oil pressure as delivered in 1973. During the engine rebuild, a Piper fast road camshaft was fitted along with a reprofiled advance curve distributer. Carburettors are original but have been fitted with new jets, needles and butterfly shafts. The needles were changed from AAU to AAA following discussion with the SU factory technical Dept. about running issues and these were found to provide a more lively performance without any increased fuel consumption. The Gearbox and overdrive were overhauled three years ago.
- The suspension was upgraded in the mid-1970s with BL Special Tuning front and rear springs (10% increased rating and rear springs with half the travel) gas strut adjustable shock absorbers and ³/₄" roll bar.
- Front brakes have grooved discs with V8 pads (10% increased pad area) which will fit the standard MGB discs.
- Ignition is now electronic with an upgraded coil and a recent re-wire of the whole car with a new loom was completed just before lockdown.
- The car was resprayed (an overspray rather than back to the metal) in 1984 and in the main this remains the current paint finish, using single coat two pack paint. The hood was a Coventry Hood from the factory model and fitted in the early 1980s.

The MGB has regularly participated in various MG Car Club events and activities. In addition to attending several natters, it has regularly participated in events from Silverstone to the events in the MG Car Club SE Centre. Types of events have included everything from the pure social Gatherings through to competitive Autotests, and Production Car Trials including occasional raids on other MG Car Club Centres events.

Regular trips have been made to Europe for the various European Events of the Year and recent long runs have included Switzerland through the Alps, Portugal through the Pyrenees, Scotland, Denmark and Germany. These European events are the coming together of MG enthusiasts from countries both in Europe and around the world. Attendees often include members from countries such as the USA or Australia and the largest was Scotland based in Aviemore with 360 cars. With all the club activity, friends have been made throughout the CRBs in the MGCC as well as overseas members in countries such as the USA and South Africa.
