Filching Manor Autosolo - John Morgan

The ancient valley in which Filching Manor nestles reverberated with the sounds of revving engines and the occasional squealing tyres as the Centre hosted its first Autosolo on the old Go-Kart track.

The Centre has been organising Naviscats in recent years and a few years ago regularly held Autotests and now it has re-entered the world of motorsport with an Autosolo. Similar to an Autotest the Autosolo involves forward direction only – so no reversing around cones or backing into garages. That makes for a faster event as the entrants negotiate the cones laid out, in this case, on an actual track.

The MGCCSE Competitions Secretary, John Morgan, was our lead on the event and with the help of the Sevenoaks & District Motor Club arranged for the event to take place. The Centre had visited Filching Manor a couple of times in the past few years and viewed its collection of historic vehicles and the Campbell Collection. We have also been following Karl Foulkes- Halbard's efforts to run Malcolm Campbell's Bluebird K3 water speed boat. It was hoped to run it at Bewl Water this year but that is looking unlikely now. The boat and the vehicle collection were open for viewing on the day and there was a lot of interest from those taking part.

These events require no special equipment and any vehicle can take part – MotorsportUK's Street Car initiative were present at the event in support of the Centre's and help promote it. It's an entry level motor sport event and all you need is a MotorsportUK RS Clubman's licence which is free to obtain online.

Tim relates:

"I've had a go at Autotesting, gymkhanas and naviscats with the Centre but this was the first time for an Autosolo so I just had to take part. Not having done anything like this for a good many years I was a bit worried about it but in the end, I needn't have for it was absolutely safe and the marshals dotted around the track all did a great job. I'm not the fastest driver and at one point had the slowest time but it was satisfying to then improve on that in subsequent runs – as I say in the video – "shaving off those seconds!". I was quite pleased that I wasn't, as expected, quite bottom of the results list!".

Natter visit to the Fast
Museum

FAST (Farnborough Air Sciences Trust) was founded in 1993 to safeguard Farnborough's priceless aeronautical heritage and the origins of the Museum and Trust are described in the attached document. The Farnborough Museum presents a selection from the FAST collection in the setting of a historic listed building. The Museum building dates from 1908 and was built as the headquarters of the Royal Engineers Balloon School. It is superbly located on a hill overlooking the runway of Farnborough Airfield – so modern planes can be seen in the air as well as historic planes on display in and around the Museum building.





The Museum includes photographs and exhibits from the early years of aviation and important pieces of aviation history, like Sir Frank Whittle's earliest jet engines, a full size replica of the Cody Flyer and research models of Concorde and various wind tunnel models. There are working wind tunnels, flight simulators for Concorde and Lightning and much more. The museum also has a wide selection of the research aircraft used by RAE and in particular a replica of Samuel Cody's biplane which made the first powered heavier than air flight in Britain here in 1908. It was an interesting museum about all the activities undertaken by RAE before the organisation was closed and QinetiQ took over aeronautical research



A Remarkable Lady Doreen Evans

A Remarkable Lady - Doreen Evans

We posted about Doreen Evans on our social media to mark International Women's Day back in March, not only was she a remarkable lady from a remarkable family but also comes under the auspices of the South East Centre with the family garage being based in Wandsworth.

Doreen was always destined for the track, her parents were keen enthusiasts and took the young family to Brooklands as often as they could and the children were encouraged to drive as soon as possible. Her two brothers, Kenneth and Denis soon became successful racing drivers and she first took to the Brooklands track in 1933 at the tender age of seventeen. Her racing career, however, was short – lasting barely three years and she retired at the age of twenty when she married. Her impact and legacy, however, was long and we still remember her today.

The Evans brothers, being older, taught Doreen how to drive and she would compete with them as a passenger at Brooklands as a teenager. The brothers wanted to take racing more seriously and knowing Hugh Hamilton at University Motors were soon the owners of a MG Montlhery Midget.

Denis had begun the family Bellevue garage business in Wandsworth in 1931 with an emphasis on tuning fast cars – the ideal place to tune their own racing MGs particularly with an expert like "Wilkie" Wilkinson on hand to do the work. He soon gained the

garage a reputation for fine race tuning and drivers, including bandleader Billy Cotton, would have their cars tuned there and being relatively close to Brooklands also helped the business.

The Midget was the first of their racing MGs and as soon as Doreen gained a driving licence they all bought J2 MGs to compete as the Bellevue Team. They competed in hill climbs and trials around the UK as a team but Doreen wanted to try circuit racing so, her father bought her an MG Magna powered by the Wolseley Hornet 6-cylinder engine, naturally tuned by Wilkinson. The car and her driving ability soon attracted the attention of Cecil Kimber who then offered them support from MG itself. A good policy by Kimber as these cars were attracting a lot of attention from the public – so increasing sales of MGs!

In 1934 Doreen and her brothers ordered three of the new N-Type Magnettes in chassis form with race-prepared engines already fitted. They then installed their own lightweight body to the cars and raced as a team, often against the official MG team. Following her success as a privateer Doreen was asked to become one of the official MG works team drivers and in 1935 she gained MG much publicity as one of George Eystons "Dancing Daughters". Named after a popular silent movie of the era, the six lady drivers took three MG PAs to Le Mans, they all finished together coming $24^{\rm th}$, $25^{\rm th}$ and $26^{\rm th}$ and proved the reliability of these cars – great for more sales!

A Remarkable Lady Doreen Evans The Evans cars were tuned to perfection and the driving was exemplary so they rarely had accidents or failed to finish. However, there was a near tragedy in the 1936 International Trophy race at Brooklands when Doreen narrowly escaped from her MG when it caught fire at high speed on the Railway Straight – unable to bail out without serious injury she managed to slow the burning car enough by the time she got to the Members Banking and Finishing Straight so she could jump clear – suffering only bruising and some burns to her legs – the MG though was a write off smashing into the paddock safety barrier.

As well as being a team member with her brothers and MG she also competed solo with her Q Type Midget winning a Light Car Club relay at Brooklands and Le Mans in 1934. She won the Women's Mountain handicap in Autumn 1934 at Brooklands in the car and had it rebodied as a slimline single seater in which she triumphed the following Spring reaching speeds of over 100mph.

She gave up her short career on the track in 1936 when she married a fellow driver Alan Phillips – she was to join him in a last race driving an Aston Martin but Alan crashed it on the first lap putting paid to her final race. They moved to America where she lived for the next forty years before passing away in 1982 at the age of 65.

Howard Carter opened the burial chamber of King Tut, discovering among other treasures his condom – no really – I've seen it in the Cairo Museum!

Adolf Hitler reared his ugly head and moustache for the first time in Munich, along with 2,000 of his lovely mates. Women's one piece bathing suits came into fashion and the future King George 6th married the future Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother.

Cecil B. De Mille's, 'The Ten Commandments' was the most popular flicker

AND

The inaugural Le Mans 24 hour Race was held on public roads as an ever growing public passion for car racing was fueled by an increasing number of car owners, not that cars dominated the roads as most dust was raised by the simple Bicycle .

At least we know when that first Le Mans was – 26/27th of May 1923. If only we could be so definite about the launch date of the first Morris Garages Special! As it is we have to spend a whole year celebrating the Centenary of our favourite sports car in order to cover all bases in the argument!

I'm not going to get involved in the argument but reflect on 4 Morris and MG cars that I have seen in the metal this year. So, 1923 and in Oxford one Cecil Kimber is a year into his tenure as General Manager of Morris Garages, having been promoted from Head Salesman in 1922. And therein lies a clue to – Why MG?

Kimber the salesman wants to sell more Morris cars – what to do? Give the public, in particular the cities richer University students something special for not much more money than a standard Bullnose Morris Cowley. It helps if as well as being a supersalesman, you have a keen eye for attractive body design and an ear for advertising copy . I mean who could resist the offer of 'A Morris Garages 14/28 SUPERSPORTS' with its sporty bare metal body and increased performance, both in stopping and going?!

Which leads me to a chance encounter with a standard Morris Cowley Bullnose which Kimber based his 'Supersports' on, establishing a precedent followed by MG thereafter – tidge up existing saloon models and badge them 'MG' for added aura.

The chance encounter was at the Annual Downton Motor gathering, part of the Downton Cuckoo Fair (yes the little Wiltshire Village that was home to Downton Special Tuning), much favoured by our C Register. Infact we were by far the biggest contingent. The car in question is an immaculately restored, scarlet beauty, with the addition of a rare Auster screen for the rear passengers protection when the hood was lowered.





Then we move to Brooklands and British Marques Day. Again MG was by far the largest make represented by the giant Octagon timeline and filling the Campbell Car Park to overflowing.

Present for the first time were 2 early Morris Garage Specials owned by a new friend to the MGCC – Michael Dacre – who personally paid to transport the cars from his Midlands base and back again in celebration of the Centenary. Miriad thanks, Mike.

We'd connected through a mutual Jersey associate – Ian Le Riche – who had worked on a local early Supersports, still, uniquely, with its original body. Bought by Michael and now back on the mainland, that was one of the two so generously displayed at Brooklands.

The other from his collection was the first known, Bullnose Supersports Salonette built in 1925. 6 Salonettes were produced, specially and beautifully bodied by Car Bodies of Coventry, Kimbers go to coach builders. MO 6709 is the only known surviving Salonette and the earliest MG known to have its original bodywork extant. Highlights from the car's history include a 30 year sojourn in The Ramsgate Motor Museum followed by a full restoration by the appropriately named MG expert – Fred Body – who acquired the car in 2005.

The car displays unusual features for its time – Marine Scuttle Vents for ventilation, (Swallows had them as well) and what looks like a fuel tank at the rear is actually a clever tool store with the real tank located under the scuttle. The car had 40 BHP, a 65 MPH top speed and originally cost £450.

And so to our final work of Carcheology -

The 1925 MG 14/28 Bullnose Supersports, 'Ferni.' – an MG with fascinating Brooklands connections having once been owned in the 1930's by Eric Fernihough – Motor Cycle Land Speed record holder, daredevil Bike racer and Brooklands Garage owner (though his premises were actually located on the site of the present Shell Filling Station on the way up to the Campbell gate entry road).

It was always thought that Ferni transported his bikes on the back of the Supersports as its dented rear shell bears testimony to that. But the Brooklands Archivist was able to confirm this by turning up a photo of Ferni sitting astride one of his bikes with the rear of the Supersports behind him, but inconveniently our hero is obscuring the number plate! No matter, on receiving the photo Mike Dacre was able to match the rear body dents exactly with the marks still on the car today!

PF 4035 cost £360 new . It was a great Brooklands day, only marred by Ferni failing to proceed on The Test Hill. Fuel starvation was diagnosed and final traced to muck in the fuel tank stirred up by the car being carried at an angle of 45 degrees in its rather modern transporter. I dunno, Mike – you do a good deed and!!

And last but not least of my 4 early MG encounters – in the Octogan Timeline, Philip Bayne Powell's well known 14/40 – 1927. The first model to display the new , modern, flat faced radiator shell that replaced the old fashioned Bullnose, truly announcing to the world that MG was no longer a Morris, but a proud little, desirable, affordable fun, SPORTS CAR!

It's an exciting time for MG with two high-powered new models and a facelifted car on the horizon. MG Motor chose the established MG clubs to reveal two of these cars at the two MG100 events.



Gaydon and Silverstone both had a different version of the Cyberster and both equally difficult to actually find! At Gaydon it was amongst the British Car timeline and was literally in disguise – covered in QR codes and photographs were not allowed. This was a working pre-production model and although it still featured the scissor doors seen on the London press release the "yoke" steering wheel had disappeared for a full one. The car at Silverstone was found in a pit garage next to race control – why was it all the way over there and not on the MG Motor stand? The answer turned out to be that it is actually a "clay" and had to be kept at a low temperature on a very hot weekend. This was the same car in red seen in London and the press release photos. Despite being a design model, all the electrics and lights worked including those doors. A running version of the Cyberster will receive a World public outing at the Goodwood Festival of Speed in July where it will be running up the hill.

Over on the MG Motor UK stand the standout was the upgraded MG HS, and this was the, not yet available in the UK, PHEV version. The facelift alters the front and rear with new lights and a striking new wobbly grille at the front. The petrol version of this model is available to buy now.
