How we remember Derek - at Angouleme in 2009 with the Club.

Sadly, we announce that the MGCCSE President, Derek Edwards, passed away on 15th of November.

**Derek Edwards – President** 

Derek was a stalwart of the South East Centre for too many years than I would care to mention. I first met him in the early noughties when he was vice-chairman of the South East with Doug Bush as Chairman. He was judging my nearly new MGF in a concours competition at Paddock Wood and this is something he greatly enjoyed at a huge number of events over the years. He took over as Chairman when Doug emigrated to Australia and led the Centre through some difficult times as key members of the committee left. Ill health forced him to step down and Chris Leigh took over as Chairman on a temporary basis in the hope he may return. Sadly, that was not the case and I took over in 2021 and the committee and council approved Derek as the first President of the South East Centre.

Derek had a good collection of MGs and Austin-Healeys and was involved with the Austin Healey Club and MGOC as well as the MGCC. John Davies remembers that" He once said he always made a point of buying red cars as he hoped Anne would then not notice how many he had!". As his health failed he sold his car collection and some of those remained in South East hands and still appear regularly at our shows and events.

As usual at this time of year it is time to reflect on the year past. It was one tinged with sadness as we lost our President, Derek Edwards, in November. Derek had been a stalwart of the Centre for many decades and his largerthan-life character will be missed greatly by us all. I was pleased to see that his funeral was attended by many South-East members past and present and his Austin Healey Sprite, freshly restored by his son-in-law, was a fitting accompaniment to the funeral cortege, adding a splash of Derek's favourite bright red colour to the occasion. Personally, I have known Derek for over 20 years and he was the first person to welcome me to the club at a Summer Gathering at the Hop Farm in Paddocks Wood back in the mists of time. For anyone that has met Derek through the club he will not be forgotten and his contribution over the years has been immense.

The year itself was busy for the Centre and introduced the first part of the MG100 Celebrations running from June to June. We held some specific MG100 events beginning with the Bluebell Railway in the Summer with the massive MG1000SE engine header (now in Austin's garage!). That was a lovely day of steaming on the railway but the weather changed for our second event at Penshurst Place in September. We organised an MG100 decades timeline and it poured with rain in the middle of the day. Nonetheless around 100 MGs turned up which was great on a grey day. The annual lunch was also loosely branded MG100 and we enjoyed a talk from Jonathan Suckling on the history of MG speed record attempts. It was so good that we have asked him back in May to repeat it at MG100SE at Brooklands for a wider audience and if you want to see the MGZTT X15 fastest estate car that Jonathan owns then it is currently at the British Motor Museum.

We also ventured back into more competitive motorsport with an Autosolo at Filching Manor in April with our partners at the Sevenoaks & District Motor Club. It was a unique venue on an old Go-Kart track and great fun for experienced drivers and complete newbies (like me). We'll be doing it again in 2024 so keep an eye out for the details soon.

You will have heard by now that MGLive! will not be taking place next year, the costs were just too high unfortunately. However, the main Club is fully behind our MG100SE event on  $18^{th}/19^{th}$  May and the Inter Club International event in Malvern on  $28^{th}$  to  $30^{th}$  June as a double replacement!

Chairman's Chatter	I am pleased that we have broken the £1000 barrier in our philanthropic efforts on behalf of The Brain Tumour Charity with a generous donation at the Annual Lunch raffle. We end the year on just under £1,200 which is fantastic. Thank you to all those who have given at the raffles and other fundraising to achieve that. The charity sent us a message once we reached the £1k - "Thank you for helping us accelerate a cure for brain tumours by raising over £1,000. That's enough money to fund six months of bioluminescence imaging on one of our research projects focused on glioblastomas - the deadliest form of brain tumour in adults. This imaging is vital to the success of our research, much like you are vital to The Charity's success as we push for progress towards a world where people affected by a brain tumour live longer, better lives. We simply couldn't do what we do, without your support and we wanted to once again say thank you and congratulate you on achieving such an epic fundraising milestone." Next year we'll be choosing a new charity - if you have a cause close to your heart then please let us know. We'll be announcing the new charity at the AGM in February. The big event for the South East is on $18^{th}/19^{th}$ May - <b>MG100 South East</b> with road runs, social evening and a full show day at Brooklands. You can read about that elsewhere but make sure it is in your diaries and tickets will be on sale soon. In the meantime have a great $2024 - I$ might see you at Brooklands on New Year's Day or the AGM on February $24^{th}$ – say Hi if you see me.

	This is a short note to remind members of the procedure when paying for events as put on by the South East Centre. For those members who would
Committee	still rather pay by cheque, this is still an option. However, don't forget to add your name and the event on the back of the cheque.
Notes	The majority of people pay by bank transfer, which does make things easier (in general) for me, as the payment arrives in the bank account immediately, and I can then assign the payment to the relevant event or regalia item.

your Treasurer	Please ensure that your name is in the description box (account name), that you add the amount you are paying, and that you add your name and event in the reference box (e.g Smith - Penshurst Place). If this is done, it makes it so much easier for me to identify the person paying and for the correct event. Once you have completed an application form for the event you are going on, please email / post to the organiser of the event AND to the Treasurer as requested on the form. This means that I have a fighting chance of knowing that you intend to come and it helps me to recognise the payment you have made enabling me to match it to the event in question.
	To illustrate the ocassional issue when checking the account, I would like to draw your attention to a payment I received into the account on 16th September 2023. The payment was for £15 which was one of the fees for Penshurst Place, but the reference contained the letters MG BPP, and the description box contained two sets of four digit numbers 3xxx - 8xxx. I have hidden the actual numbers in case this happens to be the account holders bank account number.

Committee Notes	Although many of the MGCC events are classified as non-competitive, such as the Road Runs (or Motorsport UK Title of Touring Assemblies), they still need to comply with Motorsport UK's Rules, because the MGCC is an affiliated club and Motorsport UK provides significant event insurance. As Competition Secretary, my role is to ensure that events are correctly planned.			
Competition anf Events Update	Looking ahead to 2024, The SE Centre continues to promote 'grass root' competitive events that members can enter with standard MG road cars, with little risk of damage if driven with care. This has always been part of the MGCC philosophy in supporting members to get the maximum enjoyment from owning an MG. In the main, our competitive event participation will be in conjunction with other clubs in the SE and looking ahead to 2024, we have planned primary participation in:			
John Morgan Comp	• The Epsom MGOC usually organise a <b>Valentine Treasure Hunt in February</b> and extend an invitation to the SE Centre members. This is yet to be confirmed			
Secretary	• The SE Centre would like to hold another <b>AutoSOLO at Filching Manor</b> in East Sussex either in late March or April, using their Go Kart track. This is an ideal event for the novice, as the routes are all indicated by cones and direction arrows, with no reversing or route memorising required and was thoroughly enjoyed by those MG entrants who participated this year, photograph below shows Martin Neal out on track.			

• An Autotest Taster day event on Saturday provisionally May 5<sup>th</sup> in Kent, again at the invite of MMKMC. The taster day is intended to give members a chance to have a go or practice their autotesting skills and it will be on grass and, therefore, non-damaging. Later in the year there are several clubs who run grass autotest events, for which we can request invitations.

• Currently two events are listed for **Car Trials**, **7**<sup>th</sup> **April and 29**<sup>th</sup> **September** (clashes with the Autumn Meeting at Borde Hill Gardens), organised by MMKMC. No doubt you will have seen in Safety Fast that the MGCC has withdrawn from supporting racing and the various Club Championships because of cost implications and impact on the Club's finances. Some of these Championships will be participating in Equipe events and Equipe have races planned for Brands Hatch Indy Circuit on March  $23^{rd}/24^{th}$  and GP Circuit on May  $4^{th}/5^{th}$ . The dates of MGs on Track events being organised in our region are at Goodwood on  $17^{th}$  February and  $21^{st}$  October.



Committee Notes Web & Social Media	year YouTube Channel An astronomical 1736% increase in views of our You Tube channel! That has risen to nearly 60,000 views of one or more of our videos. The number of videos on the channel has increased to 65 now and is rising all the time – that's where you come as we are looking for content. Social media is a voracious consumer of content and always needs to be fed – do you have some video of events, restorations, jobs on the MG that could be turned into a video for the channel? If so, then please get in touch with the Channel Director (always like a new title!) Tim at <u>chair@mgccse.co.uk</u> . The number of subscribers has also gone up to 316 – a 754% increase and a reminder to hit that subscribe button when you view our videos – the target is 1000 – will we ever get there? #### Website

Next in the list of success stories is the website which has increased visits by 22% to nearly 16,000 this year. This means members are using the site a lot more and it is the best place to find out about events. The events page is the most visited after the home page with most visitors coming from search engines but our Facebook page and the main club's website are also top referrers.

There are some new pages coming to the website – we are taking a look at the club's history and whilst there are some member's memories already on there we are interested in your memories of the club, particularly in the old days. Let Tim know if you would like to take part in the project.

Facebook has been doing well with a 61% increase in follows to 644 and a 59% increase in subscribers (likes). Once again this is very good and it is a great place to find out what is going on as well as updating club news. We have been experimenting with AI as well and the current Christmas image is one such example - an MGB in the snow. They rarely get the MG badge right though!

#### Web & Social Media

The rest of social media is not quite so good, whilst still showing increases they are not as dramatic as the above. The Club Facebook Chat group now has 155 members but is not used regularly. More postings and more interaction could make it an interesting place for discussion. Twitter is bumping along the bottom of the tracks with a small 6.4% increase and may well hit the buffers soon. Instagram is faring better with a 17% increase to just under 400 followers, so we'll keep that one rolling along.



#### How else do we use the internet?

Well, there is the **newsletter** which is sent via **Mailchimp**. There is a link to click to view the main newsletter so don't forget to click that button when you receive it. Mind you, if you are reading this then you have actually done that – but perhaps your friends haven't – maybe mention it to them? We also send out interim emails with any updates, particularly to events, between newsletters to keep you as fully informed as possible. You can see an archive on our website.

Then there is the **Ace Online shop**. That is the place to go for all your MGCCSE regalia needs. You can order direct from ACE and simply wait for your item to turn up. Each item is made on order so there is usually a longer wait for items to be delivered.

Don't forget the **MG Car Club** main website too. There is a Members area with all sorts of useful information in it including minutes of the council meetings – you just need to log in with your membership number. Many of the Registers have their own Facebook pages and/or websites too as well as the other Centres in the country. Your club is large and spread wide so do take advantage of all it has to offer.

#### **Coming soon - Online Payments**

For 2024 we will be experimenting with online payments for events in a bid to move away from bank transfers or sending cheques. Hopefully this will have two effects – make it easier for you to book and make it easier for the administration of the event. There will be some booking fees which go to the website to run the service but they are small and on balance, for the convenience, should be worthwhile. The first event to use this will be the MG100SE event in May.



The event is being held jointly with other SE MG Clubs and we have participation from several MGOC branches in the coordinating/planning group. Members Corner Modern MG	The MG4 has added to its tally of awards with five more gongs. Parker's Guide voted it the "Car of the Year 2024", the Best Small Family car and the Best Value car. This tally takes the MG4 to nine Car of the Year awards and over 30 in total since its launch which must make it the most feted MG ever! Keith Adams, Parker's editor said "Taking the top honours in the Parkers New Car Awards 2024 is a remarkable achievement for a value-priced EV, it's a reflection of just how effective MG's rebirth has been, transforming into a fast-growing brand concentrating on EVs. In short, the MG4 EV is an outstanding Parkers Car of The Year" CarBuyer awarded it the Best Family Electric Car, in particular the Long Range version. The judging panel said "The base car's a bargain and the hottest XPOWER model is a riot on the right road. Yet its the Long Range that'll make more sense to most; almost 300 miles on a charge, plus strong cabin comfort and decent practicality – there really is no better family EV than the MG4." At the What Car? Electric Awards the 4 was handed the Best Electric Family Car award and the MG5 received Best Electric Estate Car and Best Used Electric estate car. The MG HS has not been forgotten picking up the best Motability car at the Scottish Car of the Year Awards and finally, the Cyberster picked up its first award as the CarWow 2024 Most anticipated new car. 
#### New, facelifted and safer MGs

You would forgive MG Motor for resting on their laurels after all this positive response from the motoring world but they are still working towards new and refreshed models. In fact, the MG One has been released Worldwide with launch events in the Philippines, Iraq, Chile, Bolivia, Mexico, Oman, Lebanon and Thailand.

The MG One is a little bit of a throwback coming in pure petrol mode only, hence the areas of sale. It features the 1.5 litre engine turbocharged producing some 168bhp and is a compact crossover. It still features all the latest tech we now expect from MG including three screens in front of the driver and a clever device giving surrounding area view of the car itself. It is priced around £22k but at the moment it seems unlikely that this car will be scheduled for a European release.

The MG5 has had a refreshed look for a while now and whilst not due for another revamp yet has just achieved a five-star NCAP Green rating putting it in the top 5 for clean air, energy efficiency and greenhouse gas emissions. It also has a Life Cycle Assessment award which measures the car on its environmental impact from cradle to grave – only the second car this year to receive this.

Meanwhile the MG HS petrol has had a facelift but the hybrid version has remained the same as before. There are some minor tweaks only but it does have a more modern front end with a wavy grille.

The MG3 has appeared in some spy shots from China and is overdue a facelift. The new version whilst remaining the basic MG3 small car style will be sold as a hybrid. Surprisingly, with MG's commitment to be a fully electric manufacturer in the not-too-distant future there is not a full EV version yet – we'll probably have to wait for the next update for that.

#### **Cyberster's Travels**

The Cyberster, with the Turner Twins, continues to make its way around the globe. It has already visited most of continental Europe with receptions in most places it stops and local MG groups cheering them on their way. As I write they are somewhere in Italy - there's still a long way to go before they reach Shanghai in May.

The car has been unveiled in China and pricing has been announced for the Chinese market. In UK Pound terms it starts at about £35.5k for the "base" model rising to £40.5 for the high powered version. These prices are considerably less than what has been suggested for the UK market (£55k - £65k) so the European version may not be quite as expensive as at first thought.



#### **MG Motorsport?**

Today's MG has not grabbed motorsport by the horns.... yet. Yes, we did see MG6 BTCC cars campaigning early in the SAIC years and a proposed MG3 Trophy was mooted but failed to appear. Now we have recently seen two MG4 "RS4" cars at the World Rallycross championship in Hong Kong. They did not compete but took part in a gymkhana type event. It looks like there is still work to do to make them competitive for the actual Rallycross. It could be a sign that MG are now actively thinking about getting back into motorsport again.

So, as we have seen, there is plenty going on in the world of modern MG and there is also plenty of choice from MG Motor UK - the MG3 small hatch; MG ZS medium SUV (EV and Petrol); MG HS large SUV (petrol and hybrid); MG5 EV Estate Car (BEV only); and MG4 EV (coming in four different varieties, all electric) and don't forget your MG Car Club Affinity Scheme discount if you are thinking of a new MG. You could save up to £3.5k.

Electric Avenue I have been on the road or avenue (thanks Eddy Grant) to an electric car for some years now and have finally plucked up courage to dive in. I have always been intrigued by them and I was tempted by the ZS EV when it first came out but had some range anxiety with its 163 miles WLTP. I did have a test drive in one and thought it was a good car but those niggling doubts were still there. The MG4 was then on its way but not yet released and I liked the look of the all-new BEV so decided to wait a bit before committing. That "bit" turned into well over 12 months by which time the MG4 was on its second iteration. The MG Affinity scheme, of which you as an MG Car Club member are a member of too, was persuasive offering around a 10% discount – so a request was made in October – just prior to the Cyberster arriving at Richmond Motors in Guildford. They hadn't had time to respond before the visit so I popped into the office whilst I was there, after I had sorted out the miscreant MGF that had deposited its coolant on their forecourt. Good news – MG had that day increased the discount so that it was now just over 10%! Whoopee and I hadn't even had a test drive yet.

**Electric Avenue - Tim Morris** 

The Green X-Power MG4 in the showroom alongside the Cyberster was very tempting – 0-60mph in 3.8 seconds anyone? However, I had opted for the Trophy Long Range in Camden Grey which takes twice as long to get to 60mph but still packs a hefty punch and has a good 270 mile WLTP range. That spec changed slightly to Dynamic Red after a last-minute change of heart and luckily there was one already on a slow boat from China heading for Richmonds. I won't go into how the dealer managed that as MG Motor probably would not approve but it did mean the wait for the MG4 was significantly shorter – just a month away.



Excitedly, we picked up the car even quicker than that as it arrived a week early. There wasn't much preparation time and we were plunged into the energising world of electric motoring headlong. Insuring the car was easy and reasonably priced and it even includes insurance for the charger! A quick familiarisation of some of the controls made sure I could go forward, backwards and stop when required. Then it was off from the forecourt in a quiet whirr and a whole heap of acceleration!

Electric Avenue Getting back home was the furthest I had ever driven an EV and it didn't disappoint. Smooth when needed, intense where the speed limit allowed. Prior to this my electric experience had been with an MGF converted to run on electric, a Renault Zoe and a friend's reports on his Peugeot e-208 so the 4 seemed like a spaceship from another planet.

It's a purpose built BEV with all the bells and whistles you might expect - LKA, TJA, ACC, AC, heated seats & steering wheel, Autoplay (or Apple if you are that way inclined), Bluetooth, wireless phone charging, pre heat, Wi-Fi, Amazon Music, collision assist, blind spot alert, auto dipping lights, 360 degree cameras – the list just goes on and it is by far the best equipped car I have ever owned. The batteries are under the floor and the electric motor is at the back producing just over 200ps which is pretty good considering the highest powered MGTF was 160ps. That power is instant as well – no gear changing so it's foot down and hold on to your seats!



So, now a month on and I am still finding out what it can and can't do. I am slowly getting used to one pedal driving – no brakes! However, it can't do that with a nearly full battery. You can't go backwards unless the seatbelt is plugged in. You can't switch it off before you get out of the car! That takes some getting used to as the radio and lights are all still on the dash until you get out and lock the car. Weird, but you can only do it in the car after navigating a number of on-screen menus. The hatchback isn't powered like it is on the HS, not a deal breaker but it can be a bit heavy. The view out of the back is restricted thanks to the three rear headrests but there is an option to remove the middle one if you want. You have all round and above cameras so it's not much of an issue really.

In the dark it lights up like a spaceship with zig zag lines across the rear and glowing screens in front of you. The screens can be difficult sometimes and trying to hit the buttons to change menus whilst driving is nye on impossible so its best to make sure everything is set up before turning the dial to Drive. Steering wheel controls help with that as well with two programmable buttons for different functions so once you've set your personal preferences it's not too bad.

So, in conclusion, it's great and easily the best MG, in fact, any car I've ever owned and I am now looking for excuses to get out and drive it as it is just so much fun. Even charging, for me, is not a worry thanks to having a home charger recently installed with a cheap overnight charging rate meaning I can fill up for around a fiver. I have yet to try out public charging but with Zap Map on my phone there seem to be an awful lot of charging points around the country - there are seven within half a mile from my home! A fellow committee member took his to the south of France so I am not anticipating too much trouble when I do venture further afield.


