# <u>Charity for 2024/5 by Centre Chairman – Tim Morris</u>

At the recent AGM I announced the charity for the coming year and that is Prostate Cancer UK. The charity is chosen from suggestions put forward by committee members and natter leaders and then voted on by the same. This charity was the unanimous winner in both the first and second votes. Prostate Cancer UK has a simple ambition – to stop men dying from prostate cancer. Through shifting the science over the next 10 years to focus on radical improvements in diagnosis, treatment, prevention, and support, they hope to stop prostate cancer being a killer.

Incidentally JustGiving have changed the way they accept donations by giving the whole amount donated to the charity – they then ask for a contribution towards their costs which can range from nothing to whatever you might want to give for their admin. 2024 Carbon Balancing Scheme

## New Carbon Capture Scheme for 2024 to help save the Planet!



The Centre has decided for all key events, to arrange a Carbon Balancing Scheme for our cars which means we will be balancing our emissions! We will be working in partnership with the FBHVC and Tree-v our partners to deliver this for the Centre.

#### So, what is Carbon Capture?

This is all about the future, By Carbon capturing your emissions you are investing in creating new woodland here in the UK. The new trees will gradually over the lifetime of the project, remove a certified amount of C02 from the Atmosphere.

#### So how does it work for us?

We will be adding a 50p contribution to entry forms to create a fund to submit to tree-v to deliver the trees. As an example, last year's Autumn Penshurst event created from the run distances and approximate mileage to the start of all participants about a 972kgs of C02. If we had charged 50p to the 100 participants we would have raised £50 towards balancing our emissions; carbon capturing would have cost this amount. Sustainability is also about our waste created at events, this includes excessive paperwork and a move to more environmentally friendly ways and the use of more online and administrative functions of the Centre. "

**Other Advantages** 

Driving classic cars is sometimes frowned upon, we have all seen it.

Some event locations that the Committee try to engage with are progressively 'going green' so we don't necessarily fit in with that ethos. Hopefully by doing this we answer some of those concerns both for us as drivers and as we negotiate venues in the future. <u>Why Tree-V</u>

Tree-v are an automotive focussed offsetting company set up by classic car enthusiasts. Their moto is "preserve the past, preserve the future" They partner with Forest Carbon who have already planted over 13 million trees and are certified by the Woodland Carbon Code. Key to this is planting the right trees in the right place. Will Opie

The Summer BBQ and Pride of Ownership has returned to the MGCC SE Centre Programme for 2024. This event was run for many years, initially as the Rookcross Concours and BBQ and latterly under the Woodcroft name.

The event this year is being held at a new venue, The delightful country Kentish Horse Pub at Markbeech, Kent.

The venue is located just south of Edenbridge and with easy access from Tunbridge Wells, East Grinstead and South London. The pub has a large car park and event field. There will be a marquee, just in case of inclement weather.

The pub will be providing the BBQ in the event field, offering a menu choice.

The event entry fee will include the BBQ salads, potato, bread roll and one portion of meat as well as Pride of Ownership participation. Additional meats can be ordered on the day from the menu, with choices including Chicken, Burger (may be venison or beef) in a bun or Hot Dog.



The event opens at Midday and the BBQ will be served from 1.00pm. The Pride of Ownership will be self judged commencing at 2.00pm. Classes will be Premier Pride of Ownership for recent past winners and Pride of Ownership split into a minimum of three classes, namely pre 1956, 1956 throught to 1990 and post 1990 to date. There will also be a Car of Show. Rosette awards will be be given out at 4.00pm. **Please bring your own picnic chairs and tables.** Event includes carbon offsetting.



This has been a great way to get the club message out there and has gained a lot of traction but and there's always a but, with nearly 1400 memberships in the South East we could do with more members subscribing to the channel. The more subscribers the better our reach and the algorithms will push us out to more people – and that may lead to more members joining the club! So, if your friends haven't subscribed then please point them in the right direction.

The channel has recently been uploaded with a series of videos from MG100SE thanks to Mark Jarman of BrooklandsMembers.tv so have a browse and relive the weekend. The weekend started with the MG100 Cavalcade arriving at Ancaster MG Dartford on the Friday from the Anglia Centre with Cecil onboard. Thanks to Ancaster MG for hosting this event.

As Saturday dawned (well almost) it was road run time. 66 MGs sponsored by Cherished Insurance set off after coffees and bacon butties with route maps in hand from five locations in the South East. Cecil started at Offham near Maidstone on board the lovely ZA back seat owned by Susan and Trevor Osbourne on his way to the Fairmile. The tour wound its way through some beautiful lanes and converged together with the other four runs on the final joint section which included a few sharp hills, before arriving at the Fairmile Pub in the afternoon. Various scenic stops were highlighted on the route to make the day enjoyable. On being welcomed at the Fairmile, the cars joined other MGs with eventually 200 cars in total gathered on the lawns. The **Fairmile** hosts one of the oldest natters in the South East and has a war time history with Napier and Railton cars built nearby.

With gentle live Jazz in the large Marquee by the Jake Fryer Duo in the afternoon a great relaxed garden party atmosphere was enjoyed supplemented by entertainment from Marco the Magician performing amazing feats.

We were delighted to have mid-afternoon our MGCC President John Day give a talk covering the background to MG Centenary, before amusingly giving his own personal experiences of MG's he has owned over the years. John together with his wife Janet had great adventures at home and abroad especially in the 1880 he owned at the time. He finished his talk emphasising the common bond we have and the comradeship that is at the center of our club.

This was followed with a sell-out Buffet for 150 guests which then closed the formal activities of the day. A delightful evening continued in warm sunshine with owners socialising and staying locally for Brooklands the next day.



Brooklands famous for its MG history, hosted the MG100 event on the Sunday, with cars arriving from 7.30 am whilst the committee were still erecting marquee's, props and entertainment for the day! With the official gates opening the special designated areas for Registers, Pride of Ownership, competition car displays from all the ages started to fill up. Many MGs arrived during the morning and we had 500 cars on the day and over 2000 people attend on what fortunately was a dry sunny day. Various Club stands and traders were located around the site amongst this superb historic setting. All the museum areas were open containing some wonderful historic cars and aircraft.

We had a unique MG Anniversary display around a large Octagon in front of the Pride of Ownership. This celebrated special landmark cars highlighting their respective anniversary years. A time line of MGs was on display from each of the eleven decades in front of the club house and the superb range of competition cars in front of the club house railings. With MGs strong association with Brooklands and historically a large" Safety Fast" sign in front of the garages pre WW2, Brooklands was the second home of MG after Abingdon and several of these cars actually raced on the circuit at the time. The historical MG drivers include B Bira, George Eyston, the Evans family, Reg Parnell, Whitney Straight and more.

# MG 100 Celebration <u>May</u>17/19th

MG 100 Celebration May17/19th The main activity late morning was the opening of the test hill for pre-booked drives which proved highly entertaining for the spectator's watching the competition cars roaring up the test hill. 70 MG's enjoyed the opportunity both in the morning and afternoon which had the added benefit of driving back along a section of the famous banking. Many thanks to Church Square Autos for their sponsorship of this event. Steeped in history the Test Hill is an essential part of the Brooklands experience. Once established as a motor circuit in 1907 it was soon apparent that it was a great place for early motor manufacturers to test the limits of their new cars. In 1909 part of the Members Hill was converted and a concrete track laid up the side of it – rising from 1:8 at the bottom to 1:4 at the top. The aim was to test the power of the car's engine as it went up the hill and then to test the efficiency of its brakes as it descended.



The Taylor's K3 roared up sounding great but a red flag at the top indicated they had flown over the top into the Brambles! Luckily no harm done! Another spectacular site was the Bellevue special with its twin rear wheels amongst many other rare competition cars of all ages on the hill.

A fun competition on the day was towing an MG Midget for 100 feet along the Brooklands finishing straight by four teams. The teams pulled really hard along the finishing straight, probably not the first time an MG has been towed over the line!

The winning time of 11.25 seconds was by the Fairmile natter, with the North Surrey natter second. At 11.56 seconds. Third was the MGF Register at 11.66 with Hastings MGOC last at 14.72. A great effort by all with zero carbon impact!

The June meeting hosted the first round of the SE Centre Alternative Pride of Ownership and this was held in a lovely field including picnic tables accessed from the pub car park and a great location for the nineteen cars.

In addition to the regular monthly natter night, we recently organised a mid-week lunchtime natter on 13<sup>th</sup> June with a visit to the Wings Aviation Museum near Handcross. The museum was a short 15 minute drive away. The museum has a large collection of items with a selection on display at any one time. It includes an eclectic mix of displays including:

- Recovered aircraft remains, some of which are quite rare such as a Bell P63c King Cobra fighter and sole remaining example of a Japanese Nakajima B5N2 'Kate' a carrier-based torpedo bomber as well as a Dakota fuselage, Douglas A26 Invader cockpit-nose, Douglas A20c bomber, Handley Page Hampden, B25 Michell, and the complete restoration of a North American B25 Mitchell for static display amongst others. Many of the aircraft were recovered from Russia or the Far East Jungles.
- Specific displays on campaigns or local features such as Bomber campaign, fighter offensive, Ghosts of the Tundra, D Day and beyond, Home Front/Blitz/Battle of Britain, Dora underground rock factory using prisoners of war.
- Personal stories of numerous aircrew lost in WWII
- Artifacts and stories about local areas such as Redhill airfield, Reigate caves, etc.
- Extensive collection or aircraft engines including probably the sole example of the Heinkel He 177 Greif engine which was in effect two engines in one.

Our visit included a tour of their museum workshop where the B25 is being restored along with a Willys Jeep and recently acquired DUKW amphibious vehicle. 
Pinner Natter Update

2024	E10 Resistant Hoses -John Davies
Members Corner	Talking to Moss the other day I found them very helpful regarding the above subject. Like many of us one of our MGs were restored probably nearly thirty years ago and petrol resistant braided hoses were used wherever possible for the fuel lines. These are still only rubber hoses with additional outer protection and will therefore deteriorate over the years from the inside as any rubber hose can. With the introduction of ethanol fuels, particularly E10, it is important that hoses are maintained in good condition.
MG Matters John Davies	Moss have informed me they stock E10 resistant hose in the following internal diameter sizes $3/16$ , $1/4$ and $5/16$ inch and in lengths up to 7 metres. They are happy to supply smaller lengths of hose. They have suggested they be contacted on 0208 867 2026 for further assistance.
	Hope this may be of assistance, I found their staff member 'Will' very knowledgeable - he will help where he can, particularly if it may result in sales!'
	Fitting Tubeless Tyres to Wire Wheels
	Many members will have heard and possibly used Motor Wheel Services International Ltd tel. 01753 598386. I contacted them for advice regarding the fitting of tubeless tyres/tubes/sealing rings to our MGC which is fitted with their older style wire wheels and still in good condition.
	I was given sound advice, providing the new tyres were smooth on the inside face and the new tubes and sealing rings were fitted by an experienced tyre fitter I should have no problems. At the same time, I asked them about tubeless wire wheel rims which I had seen advertised and how they functioned as the spokes still have to protrude on the inside of the rim.
	They sent me the attached picture with the following explanation. The arrows show the special ridges around the inner circumference which in the case of wider rims requires two ridges and these will hold the tyre in place. A sealing mastic is applied all round the inner circumference in order to create a permanent air tight seal. MWS proved to be very helpful and are happy to treat any car as an individual case and have a wealth of experience to back them up.

Modern Gentlemen

#### <u>Modern Gentleman – a regular look at MG in the modern age.</u> <u>New and Used MGs – Tim Morris</u>

As the MG4 begins to enter the second-hand market it has picked up another award as the best Used EV at the 2024 Automotive Management Awards recognising "the MG4's excellent performance, reliability and strong residual value since the car was launched in MG's home market in 2022". Used prices vary according to condition and mileage as you might expect but it is possible to pick up a good used MG4 for £18-£23k. A bargain if you are still thinking about an EV but don't want to pay full price for a new one. More EVs are appearing on used car lots and there has been a 71% increase in used BEV sales in Q1 this year although the market share is still very small. We can expect to see that rise as more hit the market. There is rumoured to be an interior facelift with colour options (it is currently black!) for the MG4 due at the end of the year and a software upgrade to improve the infotainment system.

From the days when you could wait months for a new MG to today where the market is full of them, thanks to increased imports, particularly from China. This has meant cars sitting on docksides in Europe as they find their way to dealers. The largest ever vehicle shipment arrived at Bristol Docks in May with nearly 5000 cars on board, mostly MG4s. However, the MG dealership chain is robust and they are moving on. There has been some restructuring which has seen smaller dealers inched out as they don't have the capacity or facilities for large scale sales. Well known smaller dealers such as Brown & Gammons and Summit (Dudley) have been recent casualties.

New car sales continue to rise in 2024 with BEV sales outperforming the market in May to claim 17.6% of all sales. A lot is due to fleet sales and private sales are not as buoyant. Manufacturers are attempting to address this with some amazing offers available as Governmental support has faltered. Local MG dealers have been offering £8000 off the RRP for an MGZS EV for instance making them even more affordable.

Government rules state that manufacturers must sell 22.5% zero emission vehicles this year, the current market share of 16.1% is below that target which has led to some of the heavy discounting we have seen from MG and other manufacturers. With a new government we are likely to see the original 2030 target for ICE sales to end return. This is something that the manufacturers and retailers have already been working towards (despite the Conservatives moving the goal post and as an example we have recently seen the last ICE Nissan Qashqai upgrade released.

Surprisingly, perhaps, it is the MGHS and not the MG4 that is in the charts as the 8<sup>th</sup> bestselling car this year overall. We shall see how the MGF Hybrid + fares as they begin customer deliveries now.

#### **Another Award**

The Cyberster has also picked up an award from Top Gear as the best EV roadster. Admittedly that is a pretty slim market but Top Gear's Tom Ford said that "the big news is that the Cyberster is a hoot to drive" and is "absolutely enough for a twisty loop of road." Prices start at £54,995 for the single motor version with a 7 year or 80,000 mile warranty and deliveries are expected in August.

#### New Designer

In an indication of where MG is heading they have recently appointed top designer Jozef Kaban as vice-president at the Global Design Centre leading on MG's global design and identity. This may be an indication of the direction MG is heading as Kaban is famous for designing the Bugatti Veyron!

#### Football

MG Motor UK have teamed up with Arsenal Football Club so we can expect to see some MG Logos on those red and white football shirts. This is not the first time MG have linked up with a Football Club. There was an MG-Rover link with Chelsea and a special one-off Chelsea edition MGF was produced. Exposure, such as this, does work in bringing brands to market attention. The Euros, for instance, have seen extensive advertising for BYD on the touchlines resulting in nearly a 70% increase in searches for them on Auto Trader!




#### Goodwood

With MG being a focus of the Festival of Speed at Goodwood we can expect more interest in the marque as new or updated models arrive on the market The MG EXE181 was revealed at the Beijing Auto Show in April. This hypercar concept, designed in London, is due to appear at the Festival of Speed this month. Just as the MGEX4 took a cue from an existing MG, the 6R4, this one pays homage to the record breaking EX181, which remains the fastest MG ever at just under 255mph, a class record that stood until 2014! The aim is for this car to exceed that speed with even more phenomenal acceleration of 0-100km in sub 1 second!. It is a futuristic long-tailed high performance EV and we are excited to see it in the flesh at Goodwood soon.

July 2024	<u>BROOKLANDS MUSEUM AND THE STRATOSPHERE</u> <u>CHAMBER – JOHN MORGAN</u>
Members	Most people who visit Brooklands Museum are wowed by the motoring history from the cars, race buildings and banked circuit. One fascinating item of industrial heritage that is often overlooked is the Barnes Wallis-designed "Stratosphere Chamber".
Corner	Design
Stratosphere Chamber	As Vickers turned its attention to civil aviation after the Second World War, Barnes Wallis, famous for his wartime work on 'bouncing bombs', was made head of a new Research and Development department.
	Wallis knew that demanding tests would be required to realise his 'grand vision' for efficient long-range air transport, capable of flying non-stop from the UK to Australia. To achieve this, in 1946 Wallis persuaded Vickers to design and build a high altitude and climatic test chamber, which became known as the Stratosphere Chamber, at Brooklands.
	As the Cold War became the new challenge, the Chamber was used to simulate impacts on aircraft travelling at 70,000 feet which was the target altitude for Sir Barnes' planned new supersonic plane.
	The major design features of the Chamber were:
	• Length of interior: 50 feet (15 metres)
	Diameter of interior: 25 feet (7.5 metres)
	<ul> <li>Total enclosed volume: 40,000 cubic feet (11,135 cubic metres) (including circulation ducts)</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Atmospheric pressure: sea level to 70,000 feet (21,336 metres) or 1/20th Atmosphere (0.05 bar)</li> </ul>
	• Temperature range: -65°C to +55°C
	How it works
	To simulate atmospheric conditions at 70,000 feet (21,000 metres), air was extracted from the Chamber by a number of vacuum pumps to reduce the pressure to 1/20th of that at sea level. The adjoining refrigeration plant cooled ammonia and methanol gases, which were then circulated through 16 heat exchangers, located at each corner of the four air ducts to cool the Chamber.
	Climatic conditions such as snow and ice were created by spraying water into the Chamber over the test objects, and gale force winds of up to 40 knots (74km/h) were produced by the giant fans in the air circulation ducts. The other end of the environmental scale could be simulated just as easily. Heating was supplied by banks of 200kW heaters so that dry or humid heat could be produced at will. In addition, infra-red and ultra-violet light could be used to simulate solar radiation, which meant that temperatures for any part of the world could be faithfully recreated.

#### Construction

The 36 separate major components were made in the Vickers-Armstrongs shipyard at Barrow-in-Furness in Cumbria before being transported to Brooklands for assembly. In a major engineering exercise which lasted approximately a year from the autumn of 1946 until September 1947, a large workforce from the Barrow shipyard, comprising shipwrights, welders, fitters, platers and carpenters, assembled the Chamber in a position north of where it now stands. The 200 ton (181 tonne) Chamber was then 'launched' like a ship down an 80 yard (73 metre) long timber 'slipway', taking 21 minutes for the completed Chamber to reach its foundations.

#### How it was used


Amongst the many tests carried out were altitude and climate tests on aircraft structural specimens such as the Vickers Viscount, VC10, Vanguard, de Havilland Sea Vixen and helicopters such as the Westland Wessex.

Other research and experimental establishments also made use of the Chamber's capabilities, notably proof testing items such as naval guns, clear-vision windows, torpedo launchers, armoured vehicles, and airfield and marine radar.

Some surprising uses were made of the Chamber including the development of clothing for Antarctic exploration and testing buses for use at 15,000 feet in the Andes. Some explorers even tested themselves in the freezing and rarefied conditions they were likely to encounter.

An important test was carried out on fishing trawlers following the mysterious loss of two vessels in Arctic waters in the 1950s. A 1/12 scale model trawler was floated in the Chamber in simulated gale and freezing conditions. The build-up of ice on the rigging and its effect on the boat's stability was then observed and measured until the trawler capsized.

#### **Chamber Features**

Chamber insulation – The chamber was insulated with a super lightweight foamed rubber called Onazote made by a company based in Croydon. It was similar to modern insulants such as phenolic foam

Stratosphere Chamber <u>Chamber Door</u>- One of the most impressive features is the chamber access door. This door weighs 70 Tons and is manoeuvred on rails horizontally to provide complete open access to the chamber. When closing, the door has to be slid across and pulled up onto the chamber, clamped in position to seal and the methanol cooling pipes reconnected. The door contains the main circulation ducts, cooling heat exchangers, etc.

<u>Control Room</u> - Chamber tests were controlled from the control room at the equivalent of first floor level and provided with bridge access directly to the chamber air lock. Tests were directed, monitored and assessed from here. Chamber settings were fine tuned from here by three or four staff by adjusting fan speeds and vacuum valves. Temperature and pressure were adjusted from the plantroom control room. Communications between the control room and chamber were by plug in headsets. No LED screens here, just big wheels, gauges and rotary switches.



<u>Chamber Layout and Plantroom -</u> The plantroom contained a series of vacuum pumps to remove air from the chamber and thereby replicate low pressure at high altitude. Cooling was provide by a number of pumps, evaporators, condensers and compressors making up the refrigeration plant.


