My byline photo this month shows me with one of the fastest men on earth – Richard Noble.

Richard, having been a World Land Speed record holder himself, was behind the Thrust SSC project that took Andy Green to the ultimate World record of 763.035mph in 1997. Unbelievably that record still stands some 28 years later with not much sign of it being broken.

The ill-fated Bloodhound, also originally with Richard on board, had sights of 1000mph and got some way to achieving that before the money ran out.

He is now beginning a project to break the Water Speed Record with Thrust WSH. The aim is to break the long-standing record set by Ken Warby way back in 1978 of 317.59mph in the Spirit of Australia. There is a new boat, a hydrofoil, and a new team working on it with 79yr old Richard Noble the inspiration and driving force behind it. Whilst it is highly unlikely that he will be the pilot a certain Andy Green (who "nearly" drove MG EX255!) was in the audience that night at Brooklands. Will Andy take to the water? We'll see in due course.

It is a sobering thought that of the 13 contenders for the Water Speed record since 1930 seven have perished whilst carrying out the attempt.

Welcome to the first edition of our new look MG Car Club South East magazine. I say magazine as it will take on more of that style rather than the newsletter of old. It came about as we hope to engage more readers within the Centre and beyond and looking at some of our MGOC friends it was clear we needed to up our game. Of course, we need competitors to take part and that means you! None of these are too difficult and you don't need a specific racing licence as such to take part. All you need to do is register on the Motorsport UK website and apply for something called an RS Clubman licence. This involves answering some questions about yourself and your health and at the end you will have a licence to enter – and it is free!! It lasts a year and will cover all our competitive events.

We held a "review and reset" day for the committee in February where all the committee members looked at their particular areas of responsibility. The idea was to gain input from other members and examine whether the Centre was "fit for purpose" for the next quarter of a century...or at least the next year! It was an enlightening experience and one that I think we will continue annually to make sure we are on a track that is of benefit to you, our members. Several actions came from that, and we'll be reviewing those as we go through the year. As an example, one of the first actions is this very magazine and I hope you are pleased with the changes we have made.

Finally, a massive thank you to Will for all the extra work I've put him through to produce this new magazine! Also, I'd like to thank Ray Ruffels for all his help on the old newsletter in the past. In late April May Pashley Manor's spectacular **Tulip Festival** sees this garden carpeted with over 40,000 tulips, creating stunning scenes for visitors.

For Drive it Day 2025, the MGCC SE Centre is arranging an informal drive from Godstone to the Pashley Manor

A hundred varieties of tulip are planted in colour themed garden 'rooms' throughout the grounds and in pot displays. Visitors can wander from elegant displays of white lily flowered and palest cream classic tulips planted around an old brick terrace, to the open space of sweeping herbaceous borders covered in a riot of reds and oranges surrounded by tendrils of bronze fennet, or romantic soft pink peony flowered blooms cloistered between red brick walls and pleached pear trees. Follow the winding paths down to the woodland, where the Bluebell Walk is often in flower around the same time as the tulips.

Yet more tulips are on display as cut flowers in the Bloms Bulbs marquee. Bloms, winners o seventy Chelsea Gold Medals, are on hand throughout the Festival to share their knowledge these beautiful bulbs and to take orders from those inspired by the spectacle.



Newdigate Evening Autotest - Taster Wednesday 21st May 2025



The MGCC SE Centre is continuing to encourage Motorsport in the region by organising an Evening Autotest on Wednesday 21st May 2025. Motorsport UK has introduced an Evening Autotest category with reduced permit fees.

For many years, Autotesting was a regular feature of the MGCC SE Centre programme and there was even a . Championship through the year

The event will be held in a level grass field close to Newdigate. The driving tests will be kept simple and mainly forward only.

Arrangements will include two tests running concurrently with entrants having three runs with best two times counting. The test layouts will then be changed to allow two further tests to be run.



Scruitineering commences at 6.30pm with the driving tests commencing at 7.00pm continuing through to 9.00pm or dusk. The event is weather dependent and may be subject to cancellation in the event of inclement weather or soft ground in the field. Passengers are not allowed, unless entering as junior aged 14 to 17 without a driving licence. Entrants may enter in non-MGs

The evening will finish with the rosettes being awarded in a local hostelry which may possibly be the Dorking Brewery Taproom.

There is much to celebrate as the MGF reaches middle age – 30 years of Fs on the road is a significant milestone this year and the South East played a role at its launch way back in 1995.

There were two things associated with the launch in 1995 that took place on our patch. Firstly, a press road run that started at Ghyll Manor (the former CSMA hotel in Rusper) and wound its way across the South Downs to finish at Goodwood motor circuit. This gave dealers and press in the south the chance to sample the delights of the new sports car in action.


Secondly the southern dealer launch took place at Brooklands Museum. Once again press and dealers were invited to see the car revealed in the Bluebird café.

The South East MGF Register have been staunch supporters of Brooklands from the early days as can be seen in this 1997 picture of an MG Day with one of the very first register stands.

The third and fourth "birthday Parties" of the MGF were both held at Brooklands, although organised independently by members of the MG Enthusiasts internet forum. Most of those early members transformed into the South East region of the MG Car Club's Register and continued to organise the Register's presence at Brooklands events. This tradition continues with MGF Register parking at several Brooklands events throughout the year.



The main "parties" since then have mostly been held at Gaydon, home of the British Motor Museum with two exceptions – a wet West Midlands Airport in 2000 and Billing Aquadrome in 2007.

The Register will be back at Gaydon with MGF30 on July 5th and 6th with featured celebratory road runs and Glo Cars on Saturday and a full MGF/TF show at the Museum on Sunday featuring talks, displays, crafts, traders, music and all the things you may have come to expect from a large scale MGF event.

MG Sculpture

New College, Oxford has commissioned the sculptor Paul Day to create an artwork to celebrate the college's role as the birthplace of MG. The sculpture will be cast in bronze and sited in the courtyard behind the Longwall Street garage where Morris & Kimber officially registered the MG trademark in May 1924. The buildings are no part of New College and used for undergraduate accommodation, but several features remain including the garage's double doors (seen below with a new Cyberster).



The sculptor is known for his Battle of Britain Monument and The Meeting Place at St Pancras Station, but he also has an MG link.

Paul says "Some of my fondest, most vivid memories are of my father driving the numerous MG sports cars he either owned himself or which belonged to the famous company with which he was associated, namely University Motors, which was a very well-known MG dealership including a branch in the heart of Mayfair. I grew up around the magic of MG sports cars and this commission is the ideal opportunity for me to reconnect with many happy memories and powerful emotions"

This has some synchronicity with the Centre's University Motors reunion held at The Fairmile Natter on April 12th.

The sculpture is now progressing from the clay model seen in the picture and is expected to be unveiled in the Summer of 2026. The smaller versions are available for purchase soon – they are in a limited run of just 50.

Detail from the clay

MG is doing well marketwise in the UK breaching the top ten manufacturers list for the first time with UK sale of 81,536 in 2024. The total market share was 4.18% with 27.1% being EVs, so well past the ZEV mandate. The MG4 was the 4th best-selling EV (2nd amongst private buyers) and the HS came in at number 8 in the top ten models list with over 30k sold. MG introduced the MG3 Hybrid+, ZS Hybrid+, MG Cyberster, New HS Petrol and Plug-in Hybrid in 2024 and more new models are planned for this year, the MG S5 has already been announced for Spring delivery. Year to date figures show the HS the 7th best-selling car and the ZS Hybrid at number 9. Probably the first time MG have had two cars in the top ten! MG are introducing petrol only versions of the MG3 and the ZS Hybrid pluses to the UK, as they reflect demand with 49% of people still buying petrol only cars.

Utes Down Under

In the last newsletter we looked at some of the Worldwide offerings from MG and they were a pretty mixed bag indeed from tiny electric city cars to large pick up trucks. So, now we hear that the Australian/New Zealand market is getting one of those pick-ups or "Utes" as they call them.



It was recognised that MG would never break into the antipodean Top 5 without one in their range. With the MG Maxus 9 pick up already in India you might have thought that the obvious choice but no.... or is it? The Oz Ute will be the MG P9/U9 or rather a re-badged and slightly modified LDV Terran 9. LDV now being part of the SAIC conglomerate of course. Just to confuse things further the LDV T60 is already on sale in South East Asia badged as the MG Extender! Basically they all pretty much the same! Will one come to the UK? Unlikely although the SAIC Maxus 9 is already on sale in this country (with MG nuts!)

At the least it means that there will be an MG Ute down under where these are big sellers and vital for MG to break into the top of the charts. It will remain with the Terron 9's 2.5 litre turbo-diesel for the time being and it will run alongside a more powerful dual-motor all-electric version later (badged as the e-Terron 9 in SE Asia).



MG India continues to bring out new MG models with their partnership with JSW , known as the tongue tripping "JSW MG Motor India Pvt.Ltd" company. The latest product is the MG Majestor – a large D segment SUV boasting to be the "longest, tallest and widest" in its class. It is based on the good old Maxus D90 Max and is bigger than the current MG Gloster model.

It is likely to be a conventional power source of a 2.0litre diesel engine with 8 speed auto box. A new version of the MG Comet (the Blackstorm) is also becoming available featuring a "starry" black exterior and black interior with red "Blackstorm" word embroidered in red on the seats. An opportunity to beef up the not too exciting Comet EV. It is interesting to note that these Indian MGs seem to be using versions of somewhat obscure British aircraft names – The Miles Majester, De Haviland Comet, Vickers Windsor and Gloster Aircraft Company (MG Majestor, MG Comet, MG Windsor, MG Gloster)

The Cyberster is being seen on the UK roads, and we were delighted to welcome Alan Dolby with his Cyberster to the Brooklands New Year's Day meet where he joined the MGFs and it didn't look out of place at all – albeit slightly larger than the MGF/TFs next to it! One thing though, it did draw an awful lot of attention from those at the event.





A New MG4EV?

A new MG4EV has been revealed in China. However, this will not be a replacement for "our" MG4 in the UK. The car is more like a larger MG3 in style and is also larger than the current UK MG4. The styling seems to be a little more conservative and the battery pack in the initial statement is entry level only. It does seem to be a car designed for China where they like large vehicles and smaller ones like the current MG4 are not selling well for them. It is reported they only sold 13 MG4s in China in February! This may be why a new version has suddenly appeared.

Charging and Statistics

Latest charging stats are also in with an extra 20,000 being installed last year – that's 1650 new chargers per month leading to just under 74,000 public charge points in the UK. More will follow this year along similar lines putting paid to one of the anti-ev sentiments concerning infrastructure. With MG continuing the MG4, Cyberster and a new MG S5 and the new HS PHEV that is important for modern MG drivers.

We have seen that MG have exceeded the ZEV mandate for 2024 in the UK so are safe from any "fines" although I hear that these may be waived in any case. 27.1% is a good figure but that has to raise to over 28% in 2025. With the rise in numbers of EVs sold that should be achievable for MG as the MG4 in particular sits at an appropriate number 4 in the EV charts.

The projection overall is that 440,000 EVs will be sold this year in the UK, or 24% of all new cars, which will not meet the 28% target. Many companies don't have enough EVs in their range so may have difficulty in achieving that and it seems regressive for MG to produce another petrol model as we have seen already.

The beginning of the year showed a decline of 11% but March bucjked that with an overall increase of 12.4% including an all time record for EV sales with nearly 70,000 registered – that's a 43.4% increase on last year. However that is still around 20% of new cars sold and about half are electrified in some way. In a couple of months if trends continue the majority of new cars sold will be electrified in some way.

The rise in March may be due to the new tax coming in of £195 a year on EVs and cars being registered and taxed prior to that so we will see how it progresses in April and May. With the government softening the ZEV mandate and lessening the "fines" on cars sold by companies not reaching the 28% may give manufacturers some more room to manoeuvre plus extending the "life" of Hybrids to 2035. It is interesting to note that McLaren and Aston Martin have been given an exemption on the 2030 target for conventional fuelled cars beyond that date.

MG S5 is Here!

MG have announced the arrival of the MG S5 (already in China as the ES5) replacement for the ZS for Spring 2025 delivery and a new MG4 estate is rumoured later in the year as a replacement for the MG5. The S5 comes in three guises- The SE standard, SE Long Range and Trophy Long Range.

An all-new brighter interior and extra features such as a self-opening boot and actual physical buttons. So the problem of scrolling through various menus on the move should be solved.



The ability to remember custom settings also appears for the first time so no more fiddling about on the screen at the start either. It is built on the same modular platform as the MG4 and Cyberster and there are other cues from the Cyberster in its styling. 49kwh and 64kwh are available giving up to 298 miles range. Performance is spritely as you might expect from an MG with 0-60mph in 6.2secs.

Solid State Batteries

The exciting development on the horizon are solid State batteries with the possibility of one appearing at the end of the year in the form of the IM L6, a large executive saloon. Whether SAIC will badge this as an MG or keep the IM badge is yet to be seen – it is already on sale in some eastern markets. Most other manufacturers are probably a further year or two away with their SS batteries. A new MG executive saloon would seem to fill a gap in the MG range in the UK.



However, on the first drive after 57 years to their workshop in the centre of Maidstone, the original coil packed up twice, the second time on the yellow zigzag outside a school!

By the end of 2021 I was able to test the chassis with just the bare body shell around the garden, which is always a highlight for any restoration project!

The usual 'be in touch soon' never materialised from a local paint shop so in Spring 2022 I decided to do it myself, which I did over the summer.

I promised myself never to do black again but in respect for its original colour I decided to go two tone Black/Rouge de Garance to accentuate the lines. The cellulose paintwork finally complete and cut back it was then onto the assembly of all the panels and the wiring plus lights.

I assembled the doors off the car with the newly chromed window frames and glass fitted. With visits of encouragement and help from Tom Metcalf and Neil Reynolds all was going in the right direction.
